Sir

I have the honour to inform you that on the 22nd ult Sir C Hill asked the ^{hon} Secretary of State in Parliament whether a complete set of the Orders of the (E. A. Nyasaland & Southern) Protectorates could be placed in the library of the H of C and in reply Colonel Peel promised that this should be done.

In accordance with this promise I have been in communication with the Librarian of the H of C and have furnished him with copies of such Orders as he required to complete the sets in his possession.

In connection with this however may I draw yr attention to Clause 186 (late 261) of the Col. Reg^{ns} which directs that copies of all the H. of L. and H. of C. as soon as printed it would be understood a great convenience if not only the loose Orders but also the annual volumes could be supplied as soon as issued and that they should be referred to the Librarian of the respective House of Parliament.
