Delay is a most serious matter for me. Under these circumstances, I most respectfully urge that the amount justly due to me on account of back increments of salary, be paid to me at the earliest possible date.

It seems to me that the most important point to be considered is, whether or not, the regulation promulgated by His Excellency the Governor on the 20<sup>th</sup> of April 1905 may be said to affect the terms of my appointment dated May 16<sup>th</sup> 1904, as regards my salary. This being the case, I presume the Secretary of State would be in a position to decide definitely on this point, without reference to East Africa.

I most respectfully contend that the rate of my salary cannot be affected by any regulation promulgated after my appointment.

Everything, I have stated in my report of 8<sup>th</sup> inst, will bear the most rigid scrutiny and will be found to be absolutely correct in every respect.

I trust that, with a view to the completion of my duties, the Secretary of State will pass the necessary instructions to my agents for the Colonies for the collection of the amount due to me at once of the amount mentioned above.

Collection of my resignation

I note that H.E. the Governor of the Protectorate has been called upon to submit a full report on my case, but that this will occasion a considerable delay.

delay in settlement - a delay of probably three months or more. Meanwhile my hands are tied in the matter of obtaining other employment, and at the end the matter may be decided against me, although I feel quite confident that all the statements made in my letter of 20<sup>th</sup> inst will be found to be absolutely correct. As you may well imagine, it is a very difficult to obtain suitable employment, and the longer I delay my efforts in this direction, the less likely am I to succeed, added to which the two months leave pay, which is all I have, will not cover the expenses of a long wait.

You will observe that I am still doing my utmost to pay my creditors in full, as I have also done in the past.

I feel so confident that my case will bear the strictest enquiry with satisfactory results to myself, that I ask to be allowed to attend the course of instruction, at the Royal Irish Constabulary Depot, laid down for Colonial Police Officers. It would be hard on me, if I was not allowed to do this, especially as I am confident of obtaining a Satisfactory report.

I trust that you will see the way, & arrange this, and direct that I may be enabled to hasten a satisfactory settlement at the earliest possible date so that I may be relieved from the very great

state of anxiety and uncertainty,

Sir,
