I have the honour to fined you herewith some further correspondence which recently took place between the Uganda Railway Authorities, H. E. The Governor of British East Africa and myself re my application to be allowed to count past service towards my pension.

As I verbally explained last week, to Mr H. II.
Read C.M.C of your Office, I was taken aback after
my return to England to receive the last communication from British East Africa, and with his sanction
forward you the correspondence which does not yet
appear to have reached the Colonial Office.

I do not know that I can do more than ask your earnest consideration of the facts stated in my two letters upon this subject.

To me and indeed all whom I have consulted it appears a most extraordinary state of affairs that a tried and trusted exercit of the Government (as I think I can claim to be if I judge from the thanks and praise received not only from my immediate superiors but from H. E. the Governor and the Hon. the Lieutemant Governor) should be debarred from counting past service towards pension, a claim granted to almost all the officers in the service, many of them years junior to myself in service.

The Manager of the Upanda Hailway the Hon.

H. A. F. Carrie assures me that both H. E. the Govermor and himself have strongly supported my claim in

this matter therefore I have the more confidence in asking your reconsideration of my case.

I can assure you that my duties have been long and very arduous and carried out in a very trying climate which is bound to tell upon one's constitution however robust one may be.

I beg to lay before you the following facts in connection with my suplement by N.M. Government in British Bast Africa.

In February 1898, being then 30 years of age, 7 was engaged by the Grown Agents for the Colombes to proceed to Uganda and erect the steamer "Sir William Wor inner" at Lake Victoria Nyanza, Shortly after my agriwal at the coast, owing to outbroak of the Uganda Mating, the Poreign Office transferred me to the service of the Uganda Railway then under construction self which at this date had omly resided about 80 miles. from the coast, the steamer "Sir William McKinnest" had been despatched in parts from Great Britain about. five years prior to my engagement and when I arrived in Africa, it was southered over the country of wardons distances from the sea coast. Owing to the radium being unavailable at that date, the wast of collection. and trunsportation of this stomer to like Wichards Syanza was attended with greatest difficulty. . . arrival of the Loke, further difficulties areas in connection with labour question and the want of nechanical appliances. the considered of this work, I received a letter from Sir Clement Hill, who was then the Poreign Office Administrator of African Protectorates, thanking me for my services in this particular matter and a small beams was paid me in recognition of the manner in which I had carried through the work.

As there was then no further work at the Lake and my engagement as regards the erection of the "Sir Villiam NoKinnen' hawing terminated, I returned to this country. I was however almost immediately reemployed by the Uganda Railway Poreign Office Committse to superintend the commitmention of the stemere "winifred" and "Sybil! which were then being built in this country for the Victoria Nyanza Service, and thereafter to erect these steamers. In January 1908, I proceeded to erect them of the Lake and this work was successfully accomplished by the month of Mag 1904. I was then told by the Officials that further stemmers were projected and that I would probably be employed in their erection, and pending my re-emgagement for this purpose, I returned home in May 1904, I did not take may other employment as my health had been considerably affected by my previous residence in Uganda and I preferred to wait further employment Crom the Government, About six months afterwards (in December 1904) I was engaged by the firm of Sir Alexander Rendell & Robertson, the Consulting Engineers \$0/

I was thereafter permanently appointed Assistant Lecemetive Superintendent in the Harine Department of the Uganda Railway at the maximum salary provided for that post vist- 2600 per annum. During the construction of the "Clement Hill" and the "Hyanza! I was offered benuses amounting to \$600 if I succeeded in completing these steamers within a certain limited time. This I managed to do and a payment of \$600 was granted and paid to me. After my appointment to the permanent staff, I applied to the Colonial Office to have my previous services count towards my pension. The Honoursble H.A.F. Ourrie, the Hamager of the Uganda Railway, was kind enough to strengly endorse my application, which he considered a most equitable one, and I understand His Excellency the Covernor, in forwarding my application, recommended its furourable consideration. The Colomial Office however wrote to His Excellency the Governor/

Covernor that my previous service could not be made pensionable in respect that my employment was not continuous and that the bossess uncounting to \$600 which I received were a fair equivalent in lieu of pension. If the Colonial Office adhere to this view, my services will only date from March 1906 for pension which will be a great hardship for me.

Strictly speaking, I understand that the Colonial Office regulations require that services for negation must be continuous but the reculations are subject to modification in special sirous-tanger. In any event, I submit that for all practical purposes my services were continuous in the true meaning of the regulations. I served mearly eleven years, only about two and a half of which were spent in Great Britain, an amount just about equal to the leave which I would have enjayed had I been all the time upon the permanent staff, Parthermore, during the time I was at home I was not all the time on leave but engaged in drawing specifications or superintending Coverement work for part of the time, Technically however at the end of the construction of the "Bir William HoK Shmon" and the "Winifred" and "Sybil" there were short breaks in my service. Had I been on the permanent staff, these shart breaks would have corresponded to the ordinary official leave, except that the permanent officials would have E04/

get their pay when I get nothing. I teck no other employment during these two short periods, so that during the whole cloven years, I hold that I was in a broad and practical sense continuously in the employment of the Coversment.

As regards the position taken up by the Government that the bossess paid to me are a fair equivalent instead of a pension, I cannot understand this contention as the bossess paid to me were given as a special insentive and reward for the speedy completion of the work and were daily earned by me on this ground. In any case, it is abound to say that these bossess are enything like commensurate to the advantage to me of howing my former services count towards my pension. If however the question of the bossess were the only obstacle, I as willing and have already offered to refund them to the Government.

viewe, it will, I think, be freely admitted by all my Official superiors that I brought to the work special engineering experience and skill which the Government would have found it difficult to precure elsewhere. I can only add that my work in the erection of five steamers aggregating a temmage of 4000 to 5000 tems on Victoria Nyamas in the heart of Africa and that without any delay or minhap of any kind to the satire satisfaction of the Gayermanns speaks for itself.

I have spent ten of the best years of my life entirely in the Uganda Railway Serwise at Victoria Ryansa in what is admitted one of the most unhealthy stations of the line and I therefore think that I amwarranted in asking fur fairer treatment from the Government than at present they seem disposed to give

I shall be much obliged if you can assist me in the matter, so that my application to the Government to allow my past services to count for pension may be favourably re-considered.
