Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of despatch No. 40776/1908 of the 17th. instant, and to inform you that it is with great concern I learn that His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies is unwilling to permit me to transfer to the West Coast of Africa, and it is because I feel that due weight has not been given to the case I submit in a brief form the circumstances which caused me to approach the Colonial Office in the matter of a transfer.

You are aware that I was appointed to the Land Office in East Africa as far back as the 17th. of December, 1904. The appointment at the time was purely a local one, and it was not until October, 1908 I was placed on agreement. Since that time I have reason to believe that in the execution of the duties entrusted to me I have given satisfaction and if you will refer to the annual reports you will find, as a token of appreciation, I have been specially mentioned.

In July 1907 I contracted fever and periodically until I left East Africa my health was not good, and though I should ill afford to take my leave I did so.

simply because I felt that otherwise a complete breakdown was inevitable.

Before I left East Africa a promise was made that I would receive an increase in salary and promotion on my return. Last month I received a letter from the Land Officer advising me that the increase proposed had been cut out of the estimates. I regarded this action as a request for my resignation, but before taking such a step I wished to secure another appointment. I then intended applying for a transfer to the West Coast, but I was offered an appointment with the General Assurance Corporation. I did not resign then, because I felt that the work would be foreign to me, and as it is a post carrying salary and commission it would be necessary to feel my way before giving up what is to me my living.

After serious consideration of the matter before resigning I decided to endeavour to obtain a transfer to the West Coast, and accordingly submitted an application through the Land Officer. This has now failed, and it is with regret that I resign my post in the East Africa Protectorate, for land settlement work is one in which I have taken a keen interest, and I do not think it can be said that I did not do my utmost to carry out to the best of my ability the duties connected with my office.

In conclusion I wish to say that, reluctant as I feel so to do, I cannot help ~~forgetting~~ the fact that I took up arms again. England in the late Boer war has had some influence on my Service career, though happily in the Land Office to my knowledge no feeling existed, but that there was a feeling in other circles of the Service I have had the unhappy experience of discovering, and this feeling strengthened when immigration of Boer settlers commenced who invariably came to me with land matters.

Previous to my departure for England owing to the pronounced theories on the Boer immigration question which were held by many persons and which seemed to have taken a firm hold and threatened to increase, I put before the Land Officer a note on the question of Boer settlement generally. I did this simply because it alarmed me to think that persons were viewing the "Boer" from a political standpoint, and not what it really is. A study of the conditions of farming in the Transvaal and Orange River Colony answers the question why these Boers have trekked.

To my mind it will indeed be a pity if we take a political view of the matter, for then we shall certainly

certainly lose to East Africa the best type of settler to cope with local conditions.


I do not hold a brief for the Boers nor do I advocate for them preferential treatment. In them you have valuable material for building up a Colony. Why not use it?

I shall send you my return steamer ticket as soon as I can get at my boxes, and if there is any pay due to me I shall be obliged if you will instruct the Crown Agents to send it to me.
