Sir
In confirmation of my telegram
of the 8th just in reply to your
letter no 34211/1908 of the 6th inst
and with reference to para 4 thereof
I beg to state that I have not yet
sufficiently recovered from the
effects of the Fever and Dysentery
contracted during my recent
expedition through the Northern Game
Reserve to return at present to
East Africa as requested.

Owing to the serious nature of
my illness I had expected to be
ordered to appear, as is usual, before
the Medical Adviser to the Colonial
Office before being requested to
return to East Africa. As this
was not done, and I knew that
my state of health was such that
I could not go back just now, I
consulted the medical advisers
who have been attending me and
who are therefore in the best

position to certify to my condition
and I beg to enclose their certificates

Had I only myself to consider I
would return at once, even though
the consequences might be fatal.

I think it only right however
that I should draw attention to
the fact that allegations of a very
serious nature have been made
against me and I consider that
it all justice to me these matters
ought to be set right before I
should be asked to return to
East Africa or serve again with
certain officials there.

Malicious and scandalous
rumours have been allowed to
spread and these will naturally
~~on spreading until the~~
~~Government~~ takes such definite
steps as will put an end to
them once for all.

In my letters of Aug 31st & Sept 15th
I gave a very clear and full reply
to the various serious allegations
made against me, and with all
due deference I consider that there
is now ample evidence before the
Colonial Secretary to enable him
to come to a final judgment on
the grave question at issue.

I have already fully stated my case, and so far as I can see have no further explanations to make regarding the most important points at issue.

With reference to para 6 regarding half-pay, you are of course aware that I have not only had no salary during my sick leave but have had nothing ~~for~~ from March, April, and part of May while I was actively serving the Government.

In conclusion I beg to submit that the extreme gravity of the case demands that judgment should be prompt, and I trust that the Colonial Office will see that it is due to me, owing to the exceptional nature of the circumstances to take such steps as will put the matter right.
