I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of Oct 6/1908/ & enclose my letter of 5th inst.  
I regret that the Secretary of State has been unable to give me a satisfactory reply to my purpose.

All the interview for kindly gave me on October 12<sup>th</sup> I mentioned to you did not attach much importance to this & I said I gave you my reason for my desire & have them altered as proposed in my letter.

I regret if I did not make my purpose quite clear. It is most difficult now to bring a committee together & agree upon the proposed rooms even as it is allotted.
