My Lord,

I have the honour to report that I have communicated with the Acting Governor of Uganda on the subject of the grant of outfit allowance to dispensers.

2. While offering no objection to the discontinuance of the allowance in question to civilians we are strongly of opinion that Non Commissioned Officers seconded from the Royal Army Medical Corps should still receive it for the reasons stated in the attached memoranda by the Principal Medical Officers of the two Protectorates.

In this Department the appointments carrying with them an outfit allowance are:-

Principal Medical Officer's Clerk.

Medical Storekeeper

2 Dispensers

1 Lunatic Warder

These posts are filled by Non-Commissioned Officers of the Royal Army Medical Corps, all, but the last, serving on their Army engagement, so the question of the retention of an outfit allowance for civilians does not affect this service.

The retention of an outfit allowance for soldiers seconded from their Corps is, I think, a just and equitable allowance. The provision of a tropical outfit would bear hardly on them as compared with a civilian, who could probably utilise a great deal of his home kit.

Besides, the necessity of suddenly being called on to spend £20 or £30 on proceeding to take up a new appointment would weigh heavily on a number of suitable candidates, and militate seriously against this service being popular with a very desirable class of men.

I agree with Dr. Milne's minute regarding persons
 selected from the Royal Army Medical Corps. I do
 not think it is necessary to continue outfit allow-
 -ances in the case of Civilian Dispensers.

The Royal Army Medical Corps men are, as a class,
 men of wider and more useful experience than the
 civilians whom we get as Dispensers, who are
 usually Chemists' or Druggists' Assistants, with no
 hospital or surgical experience. The salaries paid
 are the same in each case.


