This matter has not been handled

very efficiently by the local authorities
they have had the whole of the current
financial year in which to negotiate for
a reduction of the G.A.P. contribution to
the Zanzibar Station or to make out
case for a separate station at
Mombasa, & I think now, when the
Estimates for 1910-11 are actually
before us, that they will make
some progress in this direction. They
have however anticipated the case
of it being assumed in the Estimates
for 1910-11 that the G.A.P. will only
contribute a $\frac{1}{3}$ share (£1750) instead
of a $\frac{3}{4}$ share (£1500). That the Uganda
Govt. will be content to pay a $\frac{1}{2}$ share
(£1000) instead of $\frac{1}{4}$ (£500) & that
the Uganda Govt. will accept a
share (£500) although they have paid
nothing hitherto.

My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's despatch No. 615 of the 27th of August last, I hope the honourable Minister will be pleased to receive my report that after consultation with the Treasurer and the Principal Medical Officer, I consider it would, in the view of avoiding any unnecessary large capital expenditure, be existing arrangement of maintaining a Quarantine Station with Zanzibar should be continued for the present, but contingent on this, the amount of our annual contribution should certainly be reduced and a local Infectious Diseases Hospital and Quarantine station should be provided at Kilindini.

2. Taking into consideration the accommodation that would have to be provided, it is estimated that to establish a Quarantine Station at Kilindini would involve an initial expenditure of at least £5,000, with an annual recurrent expenditure of £1,000 per annum. I do not consider this expenditure justified at present, I agree with the Principal Medical Officer in

In considering that some provision should be made for a Quarantine Station at Injekiongwe, I consider the following:

1. That the present circumstances in Zanzibar render it necessary to establish a Quarantine Station there, and there is no room of provision for dealing with it; indeed, should an outbreak of cholera or an epidemic of some infectious disease occur at the present time in Zanzibar, the port would be practically closed, for no means exist for isolating ships, or inflicting quarantine measures, save by the disengaging goods from exposure which are of a perishable nature.

2. In these circumstances we are running grave risks and I consider that immediate steps should be taken to establish some sort of a Quarantine Station at Zanzibar.

3. It is estimated that a station to meet present wants would cost about £1,000, and if the proposal meets with Your Lordship's approval it will of course be expended in such a manner as to permit of subsequent absorption into a larger scheme.

4. The remaining point to be considered is the amount of money to be contributed by the usual contribution

methodology.

5. From carefully reasoned data placed before the Principal Medical Officer it would appear that under existing conditions, the Quarantine Station, as such, is of about equal value to this Protectorate and Zanzibar, but the fact of its being situated at Zanzibar is of special advantage to that Administration, for it thus admits of use for many purely

domestic

domestic matters, which the geographical situation of Mombasa - 112 miles away - entirely precludes.

8. I attach a table showing the total annual outlay of the Zanzibar Government during the last nine years, contrasted with the contribution paid by this Protectorate, from which Your Lordship will see that the net result of the working of the present agreement is, that East Africa has borne the whole cost of the maintenance of the Station, and however equitable this arrangement was in the past, it is clear that it now operates purely for this Protectorate.

9. There are various drawbacks to the system of a capitation grant; it is impossible to forecast the expenditure and whether the station is used or not, the staff and equipment must be maintained, so that in the absence of plague or some other outbreak the entire cost would have to be borne by Zanzibar; it is more equitable to realize that the Sanitary Station is necessary to both Administrations, and that this Protectorate should contribute a fixed sum to its upkeep annually.

10. The average annual cost of the Station for the last nine years is £2,000 of which three-quarters, i.e., £1,500 has hitherto been paid by the Protectorate the Station being of equal value to both Administrations a system of equal shares of expenditure is reasonable and I think the annual contribution of this Protectorate should be fixed at half the present annual cost of maintenance and upkeep plus half of the £500 for rent and interest that is £1,000 in all.

11. The Uganda Protectorate should moreover in my opinion bear a proportion of this. Over a quarter of the Customs Import Duties collected in East Africa are handed over to Uganda and this £1,000 contribution should, I think, be shared on the same basis i.e. 4750 from the East Africa Protectorate and 2250 from Uganda.

12. Finally whatever arrangement is come to it should be made on the distinct understanding that East Africa can terminate the arrangement at one year's notice without any question or explanation.

13. I regret the delay in answering Your Lordship's original despatch; it was entirely due to the Principal Medical Officer's inability to obtain the necessary data from Zanzibar.

I have the honour to acknowledge
receipt of your despatch No. 186

of the 2nd instant on the subject of

the Zanzibar Quarantine Station and pro-

posed arrangements.

I note the explanation which

to the Government in replying earlier

to my despatch No. 185 of the 25th of

March, but I feel constrained to point

out that the delay in dealing with the

matter

...and a total of £1000 was to determine

the amount to be contributed by the

next year. I observe that provision has

only been made for £750 as the contribu-

tion of the East Africa Protectorate

to the Zanzibar Station.

It is proposed to establish a

quarantine station on the assumption

that your present proposals are approved

and carried out. No provision

appears to have been made for the con-

struction and upkeep of the station at

proposed
Killindini, which would appear to be an

integral part of these proposals.

I gather, however, that you have

no alternative but to return to the

original ~~figures~~ Estimates (the original contribution of

£1500 to the Zanzibar Station, thus

continuing the station up for another

year.
