The information as to the East African coins should be sent to the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate, who should be asked to report what prospect there is of balancing the loss (now one of nearly 50%) on the $\frac{1}{2}$ cent pieces by the profit on the cent pieces on the scale of issue which may be anticipated. He should also be instructed to report upon the disposal of the withdrawn coins with a view to recovering the special allowance referred to in the last paragraph. ~~A copy of this letter had better be registered in the East African series for the purpose of this action.~~

As for accepting the new scale of charges, which has not yet been done, we have no alternative but to accept it or go without the coins.

Sir,

In reply to Mr. Cox's letter of the 2nd instant on the subject of the proposed new scale of charges to be made by the Mint for executing subsidiary Colonial Coinages, I am directed by the Lord Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to state for the information of the Earl of Crewe that the estimated cost of the new and old rates respectively of £1,000 worth, at face value, of the half-cent and one-cent pieces for East Africa and the one-tenth of a penny and pempies for Nigeria is as follows:-

The proposed new rates of charge are based on the actual cost of production of each class of coin which (as shown by the scale) increases with the dimensions of the piece and varies according to the metal of which it is composed.

The

The uniform rates fixed in 1850 for coins subsidiary to the dollar and the rupee were intended to be based upon the average cost of the coinages then most generally struck and are not to be taken as implying that the cost of each coin was the same. Indeed, for other than the purest gold and for long years back, a sum of percentage on the nominal value - a system which errs in the opposite direction.

It seems, however, to my Lords to be clearly better that the charge for each description of coin should, as under the new scale, correspond with the actual cost of producing it. The issuing colony or protectorate will then be able for itself to set off the profit made upon the higher denominations against the loss incurred in respect of the lower denominations; and can, if it thinks proper, restrict the issue of the latter, in cases in which the public convenience of such issue is, in the opinion of the Secretary of State, not sufficient to justify the expenditure involved.

My Lords see no reason why the new scale should not be applied to the coinages now in course of circulation, but in view of the heavy charges imposed upon the Protectorate as a result of the unsuccessful experimental issues of aluminium, they will be prepared to consider whether some special

special negligence cannot be made in respect of the
