I think you must consider this. Treasury insist on a net reduction of £2,000 in the Estimates of expenditure for 1909-10. I think they have every justification for doing so. I am putting forward suggestions for effecting such a sum of reduction as are still needed on Treasury. Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Antrobus's letter of the 20th ultimo (9666/1909), enclosing copy of a despatch from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate in which he recommends the extension for a period of eighteen months of the service of Major G.E. Smith R.E., as Director of Surveys in the Protectorate, at an increased salary of £900 a year.

Since Mr. Antrobus's letter was written, the Earl of Crewe will have received the letter from this Department expressing Their Lordships' views with regard to the East Africa Protectorate Estimates for 1909-10, and pressing for a reduction of expenditure generally; and with this in view his Lordship may perhaps be disposed to reconsider the present proposal. But in any case I am to say that on present information My Lords are not convinced of the necessity for retaining Major Smith's services at an increased cost when, as They understand from the Governor's despatch, there is a perfectly competent successor at hand who might be appointed to the post without involving any additional expense.
