In England for the period was £24,163 and net £249,078 as assessed from the figures given in the final report of the Committee. The amounts charged against the Administration account in England included many other charges beyond those given in the report under the heads of Crown Agents and expenses of Committee's office and general expenses of the Committee.

Mr. Gurney also states that from the African figures of Decr 1st, 1901, it appears on the assumption which appears to have been made in the account of the year of 1901, 11. 1 ship, or there in the Afrc, on April 1st, 1901, the value of £24,163 in Gold in India, due to the revaluation of the African account balance then the fixed rate adopted for the Rupee per Rupee from 1/-sd to 1/-sd. It was decided by the Govt. to treat the "Gain" by distributing it over the various items of the account and the figures to be so distributed were supplied by the Chief Engineer in his letter dated 1st of Dec 1901 (Letter No. 205/12) and we infer a similar letter of the 7th January 1902 (Letter No. 162) in which he states that the position is as follows:

4. Subsequent payments will be to bring the balance down to the adoption of "Equipment" as a separate item in 1956. Thereafter, payment will be made from time to time as required.

5. Payments will be made in 1956 in connection with the reduction of freight charges in order that our accounts may be brought into agreement in due course.

The action taken by this department has been done in accordance with the security prescribed by the Regulations. This applies equally to officers serving under agreements.

It would appear that the officers mentioned in your despatch have not been consulted with the Regulations owing to inadvisability in connection with the transfer of the two provinces from the Uganda to the East Africa Protectorate.

I am to inform you that the necessary steps may be at once taken to meet this complaint.
