Sir,

## THE DEATH OF THE LATE MR. MONIER WILLIAMS.

## A DEATH TRAP STATION

P.D.O.  
RABAI DISTRICT

We much regret to announce the death of Mr. Monier Williams, late Assistant District Commissioner of Rabai District. Mr. Williams had only taken up Government service a few months ago when he first arrived in the Colony. The funeral services at the Cathedral and Mombasa Cemetery were very well attended.

We consider that the Government should not station a newly arrived Officer at Rabai. It is a poisonous station and has been responsible for the damaged health of many officers who have been unfortunate to be stationed there. Throughout the whole Rabai District, a worse site for a dwelling station it would be difficult to find and even officials who have learnt by experience how to dodge the climate unpleasantries, find it difficult to keep their health in this particular neighbourhood. Some years ago the Government placed a battalion of the K. A. R. at Rabai. Immediately we heard of this we drew the Government's attention to the danger of this proceeding, pointing out that this area was lead poisoned throughout and expressed the opinion that even the locally grown vegetables contained mineral poisons. Our opinions received consideration and the Principal Medical Officer of Health of the time was instructed to visit the garrison site. This Officer condemned the site and the whole garrison buildings were immediately removed, even then only after a large number of men had contracted stomach diseases.

There are healthy sites in the District and Coast Planters have found them, it is now therefore for the Government to go and do likewise. It will be very much cheaper in the end to close down the present Rabai Station and erect a new station either in the neighbourhood of the Planters or on the Ribe Hills, where the water is excellent and the climate salubrious and where the Officer will be in closer touch with the population.
