

Sentlemen,

As the new steamer "Stement Hill" for the Uganda Railway is now well advanced, and as I am desirous, if possible, of returning to Uganda; it has ecourred to me that possibly my services might be required in connection with her re-erection in that country.

I should therefore be greatly indebted to you if you would put the matter before the authorities in the Colonial Office for their consideration.

As I think you are aware, I superintended the re-erection of the steamers "Sir William MacKinnon", "Winifred", and "Sybil", besides many lighters and smaller crafts for the Uganda Railway; indeed I may say that I have been continuously in their service since early in 1698 with two intervals, during which I was employed in this country upon imprection work combacted with the building of now Steamers for the Uganda Railway.

ur. R. GRANT, having completed the work on which he has been employed on this Railway, is now leaving for England. I have much pleasure in giving his this record of his services in East Africa.

Mr. GRANT first left England in February 1896 and on his arrival in East Africa was employed for one year in charge of the Traction Engines at rail head. He was then placed in charge of the transport to take Victoria and re-erection at Kisumu of the S.S. "Sir William Mackinnon".

On completion of this work in 1901 he was re-engaged for the inspection and erection of the two 700 tons S.S. "winifred" and "Sybil".

Whilst these vessels were under construction in England Er. GRAFT acted as Inspector under Sir E.J. REED. Returning to East Africa in Pebruary 1908 he fitted up the Workshops and Isunching berths at Port Florence and subsequently was in entire charge of the erection of the 2 twin screw steamers "Winifred" and "Sybil" each of 700 tons displacement and 500 E.P.

In addition to this Mr. GRANT re-erected five 100 ton iron lighters for the lake, laid down pumps, boilers, tanks, pipes, etc. for Port Florence water supply and superintended the running of the steamers for 15 months. Pinelly hangave a complete overhaul to the steamers "Exampals" and "Sir Elliam Mackinnan."

In every capacity in which Mr. GRANT has been employed he has proved himself a most capable and experienced engineer.

He now leaves this railway only because he has completed the work on which he was employed and there is at present no suitable wasancy on our staff for him.
