## Recorders of Titles.

Very important of appointing men with local knowledge & experience. Recommended in Body Report & in W S & de laacy Report. No particular posts will be mentioned.

I reply that we will now know from our despatch of the 3rd of Feb (in 796) the nature of the questions which must be settled before the appointment of the three Deputy Recorders of Titles can be proceeded with, that the S.P.B. agrees with him in thinking that, in fixing their appointments, if they are eventually inserted, great weight should be attached

to acquaintance with the native language,  
laws, and customs of the districts involved,  
~~provided~~ that it is combined with ~~and~~  
<sup>legal</sup> adequate knowledge and experience, and  
that he would be glad if the Govt. would  
send home a list of those, whether already  
in the service or not, whom he considers  
specially equipped for the work, giving  
their qualifications in detail, so that their  
claims may be compared with those of any  
other candidates whom the S. of B. may  
have under consideration; and say that  
the S. of B. proposes, in case of need, to  
consult W<sup>r</sup> Shearman Turner, the  
Recorder of Titles, who is now at home  
on leave, and who, from his knowledge  
of the questions involved, should be in  
a position to advise as to the qualifi-  
cations required.

My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's telegram of the 15th instant and previous correspondence respecting the appointment of Deputy Recorder of Titles, I have the honour to express a hope that the special qualifications needed may receive very careful consideration before any candidate is selected in preference to those who, like Mr. Botry Pigott, are in possession of local knowledge and experience.

2. The work which these officers will have to do demands an intimate acquaintance with native languages, laws and customs such as it would be difficult for any lawyer newly appointed from England, however able, to acquire until he had resided for some time in the country.

3. There are fortunately at any rate two candidates at present in the Protectorate, Mr. Botry Pigott and Mr. W.E.F. de Lacy, who besides being fully qualified in a legal sense, have been very successful in their relations with natives.

I have recommended Mr. Pigott for the earliest appointment because Mr. de Lacy, who is a lawyer in private practice, has been connected professionally with several European concessionaires in the neighbourhood of Malindi, where the Land Titles Ordinance first comes into operation, and it might therefore be desirable to defer offering him a post until the district in question has been dealt with. I am however of opinion that he will be able to render us very valuable assistance elsewhere.

5. I observe that Your Lordship expresses a doubt as to the Treasury sanctioning the proposals made for increasing the staff of the Recorder of Titles. I sincerely trust that no difficulties will arise in this respect as I consider the matter to be of supreme and urgent importance. The honour and credit of the Government is in fact involved and we shall be most severely and justly criticized if we fail to fulfil our obligations.
