My Lord,

I have the honour to submit the fellowing report and recommendations regarding the trant of the privilege of free quarters or allewances in lieu thereof to the Non-European Clerical Staff of the Protectorate.

2. It does not appear ever to have been definitely

- laid down that the staff referred to is entitled to free quarters as a right. Ritherto the non-Muropean Clerical Staff have not as a general rule received letters of appointment and no allusion to the privilege of free quarters is made in the "Conditions of Bervices relating to their appointments which have been is executed time to time.
- 5. In fact, the mans of decisions and precedents

which in the past has been held to apply to this very considerable portion of the Staff of the Protectorate cannot be regarded as at all satisfactory. Your Lordship will however recellect that this matter has recently been thoroughly examined in conjunction with the Uganda Protectorate and that certain regulations have recently received the approval of Your Lordship. In future all clerks will receive proper letters of appointment and their appointments will be duly notified in the Official Gazette. The whole of the existing permanent Clerical Staff will be gazetted in a short time but the announcement has been delayed pending a decision on the proposal to split up the 4th grade into three distinct grades.

In the absence of any comprehensive regulations prescribing the terms of service for clerks, in the earlier days of the Protectorate, certain usages crept in, which through long custom have practically assumed the aspect of recognised rights and privileges. The regulations approved by Your Lerdship in 1908 together

with the subsequent modifications thereto have removed most of the doubts which existed as to such rights and privileges but the question of free quarters still requires to be settled. The existing position is as follows:-

- 5. At Mombasa meither free quarters nor allewances in lieu thereof are given to any of the new surepean Clerical Staff.
- which special reasons exist free quarters or allowances are not granted as a general rule. At some of the substations, however, aspecially exercise stations, severnment quarters are allowed to the Staff free of rent.

 The usual reason for this privilege is that at such stations there was no successodation whatever which the Staff could rent and the Government therefore provided the necessary quarters. In other instances quarters or allowances appear to have been granted as a special and personal concession to individuals.

- 7. At up-country stations, other than Nairobi, quarters for clerks are erected as part of the station buildings.
 No allowances are granted in lieu of quarters except in one or two instances at Kisumu which is new a township of sufficient importance to allow of quarters being rented.
- 8. At Nairobi itself a large number of Government quarters exist and are allotted to Clerks. Other clerks draw house allowances according to a scale prescribed in 1806, provided they entered the service prior to April let 1809 when the practice of granting allowances in lieu of quarture was discontinued in the case of all slower appointed from that date onwards.
- 8. It is the position which exists at Mairobi which is the most impactisfactory feature affecting the question. When the Sovarmment first stationed an Officer at Mairobi it was similar to other up-country stations. We land was taken up and there were no buildings which could be rented by the Starr, Clarks quarters were consequently exceted, together with other necessary station buildings. But a township sprang up very rapidly, the European and Asiatic communities.

sterdily increased and now clerks have no difficulty in making their own housing arrangements.

- for the Clerical Staff, the Government continued to erect fresh quarters from year to year as funds permitted and the increase in the Staff demanded them.

 Eventually the task of providing sufficient accommodation at a time when the expenditure of the Protectorate was being more strictly limited, became too great a burden on our finances and we had to resort to the practice of granting house allowances.
- 11. From what I have explained above it may I think
 be deduced that the original intention of the Government was only to provide quarters for the Clerical
 staff at those stations where it was impossible for
 them to make their own arrangements and that the
 evolution of Mairobi from an isolated Administrative
 station to the Headquarters of the Government and by
 far the most important centre of European colonisation
 which

which we now find ourselves.

- first a small rent had been charged for Government buildings occupied by Clerks. But in many cases the quarters were (and are still) of a very temperary nature. Grass huts, wattle and daub buildings and other cheap and non permanent erections were largely used and it is possible that the extra expense, the hardships and the general isolation to which the upcountry starf was subjected in the pre-Railway days were taken into account and the provision of free quarters considered as some compensation for these disadvantages.
- 13. The construction of the Railway and the general development of the interior have now however introduced an entirely new element into upcountry life and I see no reason for providing free quarters for the non-European Clerical Staff at upcountry stations where they can make their own arrangements any more than at Membasa where the privilege never has been enjoyed.
- 14. I do not propose to recommend to Your Lordship
 that the privilege of free quarters be extended to Non-European clerks stationed at Nombasa nor that any

further quarters be erected for them at Nairobi, apart
from any question of expense, I consider the pay and
terms of service sufficiently liberal and attractive
without the additional perquisite of free lodging; therefore,
in order to clear up the existing unsatisfactory state
of affairs, I have the honour to make the following
suggestions for Your Lordship's consideration.

- 15. (1) Government quarters for the non-European Clerical Staff will only be provided at these stations where it is not possible for Clerks to make their own arrangements, of which possibility the Sovernor is to be sole judge.
- (2) Where granted, the value of the quarters will in no case be considered as a portion of the pensionable employees of the occupier but will be regarded as a special privilege and not a right.
- (3) In order that the privilege hitherto enjoyed by the existing Staff may be safeguarded clerks who have been allowed to becupy free quarters or draw allowances in the past, may continue to do so subject to the provise immediately preceding.

- (4) As the Clerks quarters in Nairobi become

 valuate they will be disposed of; and similarly, should other important townships spring up round Government stations, the Clerks quarters will be sold unless required for other purposes.
- contained in the foregoing paragraph I have the honour to record my opinion that it is most inadvisable to confine the Non-European dovernment staff in a location by themselves as is practically the case at present. The quarters have been erected at a considerable distance from the centre of the town and the Government Offices. The Staff comprises a large variety of creeds and castes and their isolation in the portion of the town set aside for their accommodation tends to draw a distinction between the Government and unofficial communities which I consider most undesirable.
 - 17. It will be some time before we can dispose of all the existing quarters, but I would not propose to fill vacant quarters by allotting them to clerks who

are at present drawing house allowances for the reasons given above. Were it not for the additional recurrent expenditure that would be entailed I should go further and recommend to Your Lordship that the whole of the Non-European Staff quarters in Nairebi be immediately disposed of and the present occupiers granted compensating house allowances.

18. In this despatch I have hitherto referred to "Non-European Clerical Staff" only but I wish to extend my recommendations to the whole Non-European staff subject to exceptions in special cases where for departmental reasons it is considered necessary to house the Staff in or near, Government Offices, hospitals, prisons, Oustoms houses and other buildings.
