Moreover, owing to his later  
departure, it was possible to have a  
detailed discussion of all his letters  
with W. Coll on the 5<sup>th</sup> of Dev. The  
record of this interview is attached  
to C. It was again understood  
that [see p. u. of the memo. attached to  
that paper] that he would put himself  
in commun' with the hand Dept. on  
his return, so that the Govt. would  
settle things with him finally.

My Lord,

With reference to the correspondence  
respecting Mr. Cobb's concession ending with Your  
Lordship's Confidential despatch of April 5th I  
have the honour to report as follows on the present  
state of the case.

2. In Your Lordship's despatch Confidential of  
December 10th 1908 / I was informed inter alia that  
Mr. Cobb had been requested to place himself in  
communication with the Land Office on his return to  
the Protectorate. He came back, I understand, in  
January last, but he did not approach the Land  
Office or make any reference to his Highland

interests.

interests until May 18th when he wrote to the  
Secretariat asking for replies to his letters of  
November 18th and December 2nd 1908 which he said  
had been promised to him through me by Your  
Lordship.

3. I did not understand this and asked Mr.Cobb  
to come and see me in order to arrive at some  
definite understanding. At our interview he  
produced a telegram from Your Lordship stating  
that he would receive replies to the letters  
mentioned above through the Governor of the  
East Africa Protectorate.

4. This telegram was not alluded to in  
the previous correspondence nor were any replies  
forwarded to me. I gather, therefore, that  
there must have been some misunderstanding  
between Your Lordship's Office and Mr.Cobb.

5. I then took up with the latter the various land questions arising from his concession on Mau. I informed him that I was prepared to go with him to the land in question and finally adjust the matter; that it would be impossible to concede any general use of forests over a period of years, but that in the interests of forest preservation and his own I would be quite prepared to include some portions of jutting and shutting forest lands. He enquired whether it would be possible for him to acquire the whole of the land available on the Mau, which is estimated to be 70,000 acres. I informed him that I could not support this proposal. He then requested that, if possible, the development conditions of his own land and of any other

farms on this Mew area should be made somewhat more stringent than usual. This matter I told him would receive my consideration on the spot. He asked me to visit the land in September as the present time would be unsuitable owing to the rains. To this I have agreed.
