My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's Confidential despatch of February 11th last I have the honour to transmit herewith a memorandum and estimate by the Director of Agriculture detailing the measures, which are being taken to combat East Coast fever, and showing the precise manner in which it is proposed that the money should be spent.

2. The necessary funds can be found as follows:-
  - (1) By reallocation from schedule 23<sup>a</sup> of the current year's estimates £ 6,701.
  - (2) By supplementary estimate met from savings on expenditure sanctioned for 1909-10 under schedule 23<sup>a</sup> £ 4,650.
3. The latter sum is rendered available because, owing to Your Lordship's sanction being received - what late in the year, it was impossible to spend a later part of the £5,000 supplementary estimate before March 31st 1910, and at the same time the amount taken into account in estimating the cost of the same.

The scheme for the suppression of East Coast  
Fever based on resolutions practically unanimously  
carried by the Quarantine Board, submitted to and  
generally approved by His Excellency the Governor, is  
generally as follows:-

1. To suppress East Coast Fever in one area to start with. The area has been defined in the rules dated 29th April 1910 promulgated under the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1906.
2. To sub-divide the area into *city in* ~~wards~~ and Bureau ~~area~~ zones.
3. To move all Native-owned cattle now on Government farms to the Native area as soon as possible.
4. To brand all cattle in the Quarantine area as the most effective means of preventing the illicit movement of cattle and thereby prevent the spread of the disease.
5. To clean the infected area by a regular system of de-stocking and passing through temperature boxes.
6. To provide a system of transport while the roads are closed to, or transport and being cleaned, during which period unimmunized cattle would not be available for transport work.

To provide bread for native grazing.

The cost of carrying out the above scheme has been carefully considered and the accompanying statement of expenditure is submitted accordingly.

I am confident that the total sum of £ 11,561 will prove sufficient to meet all expenditure in the current year, but it is impossible to forecast the exact sums required under the different heads in the statement, and they must therefore be taken as approximate.

The chief expenditure is on fencing necessary for the enclosing of native reserves. For these fences no direct monetary return is to be expected. They form however a valuable asset to the country, preventing as they do the illicit movement of cattle and thereby preventing the spread of contagious disease.

To further prevent the surreptitious movement of cattle it was essential to brand all cattle the property of white settlers and Natives in the scheduled areas. To carry out a system of branding to de-stock infected areas, to pass cattle through temperature boxes, to patrol the infected zone, and to keep vigilant watch over the active cattle, considerable white labour was necessary. As the removal of the cattle belonging to natives takes place, the services of many of the Stock Inspectors, as well as of many agreements, will be dispensed with.
