Both I myself and the members of the Executive Council are strongly opposed to the suggestion of natives to take part in the exhibition, except perhaps in the case of troops, who would be subject to discipline.

Participation by any other branch of the Exhibition would, we think, be in the interests of the Protectorate.

Their dress should be plain and to last, simple and dignified, and they will be given a small allowance - the value equivalent to the wages usually paid to persons of their class in their own country - to maintain themselves.

It should be the obligation of the Government to employ some competent persons to visit the colonies, familiar with the language, and to select a number of the best of the young men, who will be willing to undertake the education of the natives who would come to London, and to provide the necessary material for the purpose, as well as the necessary staff which would add to the picturesque and instructive character.

It would be necessary that this gentleman should place himself in communication with me, and that negotiations should be conducted through him.

It is intended that these articles and their resources should form an integral part of the curriculum, and that the other classes should be conducted in accordance with the plan proposed in the enclosed form, as a guide.
