Extract from the Minutes of the
xxv of the meeting of the Concessions
Committee held at 2nd December 1910.

1st Subject L. It was pointed out that, in his despatch of 2nd March 1907 respecting the terms on which it is now proposed to grant the concession to be made, the Governor asked that the grant in the former instance of an application a native reserve should not be taken as a precedent; so the Committee agreed that in the present case the boundary should be so drawn as to exclude the portion of the native reserve shown in the map. It was further agreed that a proviso should be made against the roads being cut through the native reserve.

At this point it was decided the Committee took the map.

On the question of cultivation it was agreed that the opinion that if the concessionaires intended to grow fibre there was no fear of the land becoming exhausted but it was agreed that the present application was for exploiting and working wild fibre only and that it was therefore necessary to guard against the reckless cutting of trees.

It was agreed that the fine "trees" mentioned in the proposed conditions should be "return".

The question of "British Coal" was raised by Mr. Barnley but it was held that in this case the requirement was unnecessary.

It was also agreed that the Federal and State
Committee would draft a bill to the Congress of the
United States that the Governor should be asked to
submit to the Commonwealth State the draft of a
lease to be used not only in the present instance,
but also to serve as the model for a usual form of
lease for future use. That the Committee further prop-
osed that said bill contain the following provisions:

(A) That it is necessary to ensure that the
revenue of the Commonwealth under the land tax
fully provides for State expenses.

(B) That the lease is valid to the extent
of the revenue of the State from the same
for so long as it is made with the consent of
the Legislature of the State. At the end of the
