My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to Your Lordship's despatch No. 134 of the 18th March and particularly to the latter portion of paragraph 2 of that despatch, in which Your Lordship wishes me to make individual recommendations for pension rights.

2. I would therefore bring to Your Lordship's notice the names of Mr. Townsend, Deputy Director Cadastral Branch of Surveys and Mr. Hall, senior intending clerk, accountant and storekeeper, Survey Department and ask that they may be granted pensionable status.

3. Mr Townsend's service dates back to August 1902 and he has carried out his duties in an able and efficient manner.

Since 1906 he has been very highly spoken of by those under whom he has worked.
