Detail

DETAILS OF REVENUE

Anticipated revenue shows an increase of £56,500 over that for the current year. £11,800 is expected under Head 3, Licensee, and Excise, and of this amount £2,100 is due to increased hut tax and poll tax. The railway receipts also show an increase of £31,500 against which there is, as will be seen, an increased expenditure on railway working.

HEAD 1 - CUSTOMS

The decrease of £2,000 is anticipated in the customs receipts on piece and trade goods. This may be due to the extension of the railway in German East Africa which as it progresses will divert more and more of the imports for the up-country districts of the German Colony from the Uganda Railway. The decrease of £2,000 is expected on rice, flour and grain. This is due to the fact that larger quantities of grain are now being grown in the Protectorate. A remarkable increase of £5,200 is anticipated from the import duty on liquors. This is due to the fact that the Germans have been bringing in their stocks and re-training their purchasing men until they can be sure of the way in which the new Customs Ordinance will work. They will, therefore, have to import specially large quantities of liquors in the coming year.

The Treasury have suggested in former years that the export duties should, if possible, be done away

away with and replaced by more satisfactory sources of revenue. The Governor has stated that he will continue to look for more satisfactory sources of revenue to be submitted for consideration. He is not, however, in a position to do so at the present time. The 1914-15 and the question must be left open for the next year.

The amount of revenue of £2,500 is estimated for the year 1914-15 (including a liability of £500) and an increase of £200 is expected from the registration of titles. The hut tax and mill tax are to produce £7,500 more than in the current year. The bulk of this increase is expected from the single province of ...

HEAD 4. SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT

The increase of £200 is expected from survey fees largely in consequence of the work of the ... Settlement.

HEAD 5. POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS

The receipts of stamps is expected to bring in an additional revenue of £1,500.

HEAD 7. GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

The railway receipts show a satisfactory increase of £31,500, to earn which an increased expenditure of £16,885 is provided.

HEAD 8. RENTS OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY

The rent of lands other than forest areas shows a satisfactory increase of £3,500 and the rent of forest

forest area is more than doubled. The item "Miscellaneous" has been over-estimated in previous years and

the relative increase in the "summary" shows the increase of \$2,000,000.

HEAD 3. THE GOVERNOR

The provision of a motor unit for the carriage and maintenance of which two steers are included under this head, was approved by Treasury letter No. 14529/10 of the 3rd of September 1910.

HEAD 4. LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR'S DEPARTMENT AND SECRETARIAT

Provision is made for a third Assistant Secretary with a salary of £250 to £400. This additional appointment is in the Governor's opinion, necessary to increase still further the working staff of this department, and can be carried on.

HEAD 5. OFFICIAL GAZETTE AND PRINTING AND STATIONERY

A decrease of £1,000 is shown under this head. This will no doubt be gratifying to the Treasury who

HEAD 7. TREASURY

The Secretary of State desires to associate himself with the observations made by Sir P. Girouard in the letter referred to above as to the position of special responsibility in which the Treasurer of the Protectorate is at present placed and recommends the proposed increase in his emoluments to the Government's consideration as necessary. He suggests also the suggested re-arrangement of the salary of the Deputy Treasurer.

HEAD 8. CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT

This Department shows the increase of 21,196 of 1898. An increase in the number clerks and watching men and boatmen is necessitated by the more rigorous provisions of the new Customs Ordinance which, however, results in a more efficient staff. There is also to be added to these the salaries and emoluments of an Assistant Inspector of new appointment, the salary of which is to be £200-10-200.

HEAD 9 (a) PORT AND MARINE DEPARTMENT'S SPECIAL EXPENDITURE

The provision of £200 for the cost of a mooring lighter was approved in Treasury letter,

No. 17305/10 of the 28th of September last

with request similar is still retained in view of the work in Somalia.

The diminution of the share of home expenditure from £485 to £180 will be noted as a satisfactory result of the recent alteration in the arrangements for Audit.

HEAD 11. LEGAL DEPARTMENTS

A separate letter is being addressed to the Treasury with regard to the salaries of the principal judicial and legal officers. It is unnecessary to add anything to what is said in that letter in support of the proposed increase in the salary of the Crown Advocate. The Secretary of State supports the proposed increase in the salary of the Registrar of Documents at Nairobi, formerly known as the Registration Clerk, which will enable that officer to proceed to a maximum salary of £300 instead of his former maximum of £210.

It is understood that more work and greater responsibility now devolves upon him.

HEADS 12 & 13. POLICE and PRISONS

A separate letter was addressed to the Treasury on the 19th of January on the subject of these heads of the Estimates.

HEAD 14. MEDICAL DEPARTMENTS

An analyst is provided for for the first time at a salary of £100-20-£500. The Governor represents that this appointment is very necessary.

HEAD 10 - EDUCATION

The total expenditure proposed under this Head is for the same as last year, namely, £7,000. The comparison between the details of expenditure for the two years is, however, not correctly shown in the Estimates now submitted. The estimate actually approved for 1910-11 was that enclosed in the letter to the Treasury from the Colonial Office of the 18th of June, 1910, and approved in the Treasury letter, No. 11574/10 of the 11th of July, 1910. It is with that estimate that the estimate for 1911-12 should be compared.

It will be necessary to consult the Treasury later with regard to making pensionable various appointments provided for under the Head of Education. It is, however, not proposed to go into this question on the Estimates.

HEAD 19 - MILITARY EXPENDITURE

The Secretary of State regrets that he is not yet in a position to inform the Treasury what he has come to a final conclusion with regard to the practicability of effecting a reduction in the military expenditure of the East African Protectorate. The progress of the consideration of this question is known to the Treasury from the correspondence which has taken place with them with regard to certain military questions in Uganda and Nyasaland. It is hoped that they come to a final conclusion in the matter within the course of the next few weeks, but in the meantime

there is no alternative but to allow the provision for military expenditure to stand at the figure presented in these estimates.

It will be noticed that the large expenditure of £7,000 is required under the Head "Military-Special Expenditure" for the return of the 2nd Battalion King's African Rifles to Nyasaland and the exchange with them of the 1st Battalion for service in the East Africa Protectorate.

HEAD 20. BOMBAY AGENCY.

The Secretary of State has under his consideration a proposal for the abolition of the Agency and the performance of the duties entrusted to it by commercial firms. There appears to be a good prospect that this would result in a considerable saving. But if any case time would be required to carry out the re-arrangements, and the provision made for 1911-12 must, therefore, stand.

HEAD 21. POST OFFICE AND TELEGRAPHS.

The Secretary of State endorses Sir P. Girouard's recommendation of a scale of salary for the Postmaster-General and of the addition of duty pay at the rate of £50 a year to a maximum. He also endorses the proposed increase of the Accountant's salary by £23.

The increased expenditure of £1,700 under this Head is largely accounted for by increases in the carriage of mails by sea, (due to a recent revision of the over-sea mail transit charges), and increased expenditure on the internal carriage of mails.

At present the work of the Steamboat Service is super-
 vised by the Assistant Comptroller of the Treasury
 for the Department of the Interior. It is a part
 of the work of the Department of the Interior and purely
 a Marine Service. The Governor strongly supports
 the recommendation that there should be in addition,
 a Marine Superintendent, to be responsible for the
 entire part of the Marine Service. The Assistant
 Comptroller of the Treasury is requested to
 advise the Governor of the necessity for
 applying for a position of Assistant Traffic Manager
 account of the increasing traffic and the work in
 the Marine Service.

HEAD 22a.R. BWAY FURNITURE SPECIAL EXPENDITURE

In the budget of the 11th January the Treasury
 has already approved of a sum of \$25,000
 for the purchase of furniture for 1911. It is

It is recommended that provision be made for the employment of a Special Agent in Charge, District No. 1, New York, the estimated cost of which is \$10,000.00 per annum. The services are considered necessary for the maintenance of the view of the increasing imports of the most production of the Prohibition Department in that the cost of the expense involved will be borne by the settlers.
