officials of the Government, the one-sidedness of this arrangement was perhaps of no great moment but since the Railway Agency at Karachi has been transferred to a private commercial firm, the nature of the arrangement has changed and I would submit for His Lordship's consideration the question whether it is right or desirable that this Office should at considerable trouble, not infrequent dislocation of its work and inconvenience and sometimes hardship to the members of its staff, be called upon to render gratuitously services for which a private firm receives the remuneration.-

6. That certain members of the staff of this Office are frequently subjected to hardship is shown in the accompaniments to this letter - these show that on numerous occasions they have been robbed of their legitimate relaxation on Sundays and close holidays, besides being called upon to work outside Office hours and to go many hours without food.

7. Besides the work in connection with Coolies this Office has been called upon to see to the execution of Agreements with other employee's of the Railway and to perform other services from time to time.-

8. I venture to enquire whether His Lordship would approve of this Office making charge (a) for its services (b) for compensation to members of its staff for services rendered out of Office hours and for food allowance, when they are unable to return to their regular stations for meals.-

9. Appended for His Lordship's information are some statistics of the Coolies returned to Bombay during 1904 to 1910, accompanied by some illustrations of the work entailed.-

We duly received your Uganda Railway No. 31 of 3rd instant and on calling on the Commander S.S."Nerbudda" for an explanation he reports as follows:-

"Having read over the enclosed letter from the Agent General, Uganda Railway, I regret there was any misunderstanding about their landing. I wrote a letter to Mr. Boyd informing him of the six Emigrants & for his permission for their transportation. The letter states that the Captain prevented them from landing which is not correct as I was on shore at the Office but my chief Officer who signed for these men in Mombasa would not allow them to be taken away without some written authority. I hear a chaprasi came for the men, afterwards a clerk came on board and asked me for the pay certificates which I handed over to him."

Our instructions to Commanders are that on arrival here they must give prompt notice to the Protector of Emigrants if they have any return emigrants & that they should not be allowed to leave the vessel until the Protector or his representative has been on board & issued orders for their disembarkation. The Commander was only carrying out these orders which are the orders of Government.

We do not see our way to pay you the Rs.1/- as desired.

We shall thank you on future occasions to send a responsible party to receive your men & obtain their pay certificates.

The steamer is not here now, but we understand the Chief Officer was given charge of the men and their papers, and this being so, of course he would not part with same except to someone in authority.

As to the reasons for the Chief Officer being put in charge of the men, we must refer you to the authorities who despatched the men from Mombasa.

2. I request you will be good enough to make enquiries into the matter and kindly inform me of the circumstances under which the Last Pay Certificates of the Emigrants in question came into possession of, and were retained by, an Officer of the S.S."Nerbudda".

3. I regret that I am unable to promise compliance with the request conveyed by the last para of your letter No.64 dated the 8th instant, and shall be obliged if you will kindly issue such orders as you may deem expedient to ensure that no hindrance may in future be given to the progress of returned Emigrants either by unauthorized restriction of their movements or undue retention of their papers.-

I have the honour to report that certain returned Emigrants from the Uganda Railway, arrived on the 2nd instant per S.S. "Verbudda" met with delay in disembarkation here.- After they had disembarked and been conveyed to the Railway Station it was discovered that their Last Pay Certificates were in the possession of the ship's Officers on board the S.S. "Verbudda".- A request preferred to Messrs Mackinnon Mackenzie and Co., for an account of the circumstances has met with no satisfactory explanation, but they give it to be understood that the Chief Officer "signed for" the men in Mombasa and consequently would not "allow them to be taken away without some written authority" and that "the papers were made over to the Commander by the authorities who put the Emigrants on board at Mombasa".- They add further "we cannot instruct the Commander to decline to carry out the orders of the authorities at Mombasa".-

2. The Emigrants themselves stated that they received

some papers at Mombasa which were taken away from them by the ship's Officers.-

3. I shall be much obliged if you will be so good as to cause enquiry to be made in the matter as there is no authority under which restraint can be put upon returned Emigrants after they have been passed by the Medical Officer and the Protector of Emigrants.-

With reference to your letter of November 26th respecting the detention of papers belonging to coolies returning from the Uganda Railway I have caused inquiries to be made and it appears that it usual for the ship's officer to take charge of such leave papers, as they are otherwise liable to be lost, which causes great inconveniences.

2. The system has worked well hitherto and the Manager is reluctant to introduce any change.-

3. It is suggested that the papers were detained by the Officer of the "Verbudda" on account of their being no responsible person to receive them and I should be much obliged if you would make arrangements to send some one authorized to give a receipt for them to meet batches of coolies arriving in the future.

states the Commanders add: to be set the papers were made over to him by the authorities who sent the migrants on board at Mombasa. also that "we cannot instruct the Commanders to enable us carry out the orders of the authority at Mombasa" which leaves it to be inferred that those authorities ordered him to detain the migrants L.P.Certs. - No. 65 says "we understand the Chief Officer was given charge of the men and their papers". No. 64 says the Capt. reported to the Chief Officer who signed for these men in Mombasa would not allow them to be taken away without some written authority" - There is no evidence to show that the men or the papers were placed in charge of either the Captains or the Chief Officer beyond the Captains Statement on which some doubt is thrown. In para 2 of No. 65 another fact is mentioned, and afterwards their papers were given up without any written authority. -

The men when asked to produce their last Pay Certifs stated that they had been taken from them by the steamer's Officers. -

When Office opened on the 2nd Inst and it was noticed that the S.S. "Nerbudda" had arrived with the returned Emigrants, Sepoy Sitaram was sent as usual at about 11 a.m. with instructions to meet the men and take them to Grant Road Ry. Station. - Sitaram states:- that he went on board and informed the Officer on duty that he had come for the men, he was told that they could not be allowed to land in the absence of a written authority from this Office, as he had signed certain papers in connection with them when they were booked at Mombasa. - The paper then came to Office at 12-30 P.M. and was seen again with Mr. Phirozebhoy. - Mr. P. states that when he interviewed the Captain he was told that on such occasions some responsible person should always in future come to receive the men and that the men cannot be given in charge of a chaprasi without some written authority. - The men were then allowed to land at about 2 P.M. and Sitaram took them to the Station. - At 5-30 P.M. I went to the Station to receive the men's L.P.C's and give them rail tickets. - When asked to produce the L.P.C's the men told me that they had no papers with them. - When questioned as to whether they did not receive any papers at Mombasa they stated that they did receive some papers but that these were taken from them by the ship's Officers. Dear Mr Simson,-

I am sorry I could not talk this matter of returned Emigrants, over with your man yesterday but I was very busy and had to leave it till this morning. I dont see that there need be any trouble at all over this question. Sometimes you write & tell me that a ship is expected with returned Emigrants on board and ask me to let you know when she is signalled. This I always do except when the ship comes in late at night, when there would be no one in your Office. Then I must wait till next day. So far as I am concerned I have nothing to do with the dis-embarkation of the men. What I want to do is merely to see the men and find out if they are pleased and satisfied with everything. Beyond that I do nothing. They can land alone. The questions you ask rest entirely with you. I have put some answers to them however which I hope will help you. I would suggest however that either a responsible person be sent to meet these men or a note be sent by the sepoy authorizing him to act for you. This I think would save any more similar trouble in future.

It is very kind of you always to let me know when a vessel is signalled as it enables me to send to meet the men without delay.—

Arrival of 23 Returned Emigrants of Uganda Railway

On SUNDAY i.e. 9th February 1908.

On Sunday the 9th Instant at about 8-30 a.m. the office māmal came to my house and informed me that the S.S. "Sultan" had arrived with 23 Returned Emigrants of Uganda Railway.- I went with the office peon to Ballard Pier and thence on board the steamer in the stream to land the men, but on going there I was informed that all passengers had been sent to disinfection shed at Prince's Dock.- From Stream I went to Prince's Dock and after a great deal of trouble I found out the men, and took them all to the Grant Road Station except one who was detained in quarantine being sick.- At about 3 p.m. I went to Head Clerk's house for money to purchase tickets for them.- At about 5 p.m. when I wanted to give them Railway tickets for Lahore at the Grant Road Station they refused to accept them saying that they were tired of the sea voyage and asked for rations for two days which I could not give.- I again went to Head Clerk's house at about 5-30 p.m. to ask his advice but he was not there.- Then at about 7-10 p.m. I went to him again and told him about the difficulty. He came with me to the Station to inform the men but on our going there we found that they had left that place, so we went home at about 8 p.m.-

The next day when I came to office at 11 a.m. I was sent again to Grant Road Station to give them tickets. As all the men were not present at that time, I had to wait there up to 2 p.m. when I gave them tickets & returned to office at about 3 p.m.- Again I went to the Station at about 7 p.m. to see that they all have gone and returned home at about 9 p.m.-
