Employment of Mr. Zaphiro.

Send letter for Mr. Zaphiro accepting appointment of public employee & drawing pay &c &c
allowance other than his expense of return journey & travelling expenses from Libo to London - ask what answer he returns.

Mr. Fiddes,

Mr. Zaphiro's present pay is £200 a year and a subsistence allowance of 10/- a day. This subsistence allowance will, of course, not be paid when he comes on to the new emoluments of £400 a year with travelling allowance on the ordinary scale of District Commissioner.

We can instruct the Crown Agents to issue salary to him at the rate of £200 a year from the 25th April up to the 6th July.

As to his travelling expenses, we got the Treasury to agree to his having travelling expenses for the journeys between Adis Ababa and Jibuti (see 4664), on the ground that this was a privilege granted to the members of His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa. I fear that we cannot go further. It was not by our instructions that Mr. Zaphiro came to England, and his travelling expenses between Jibuti and this country must, I am afraid, be considered his own affair.

? Inform Foreign Office accordingly; instruct the Crown Agents as to the issue of pay, and send the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate a copy of the correspondence for his information and guidance.

With reference to your letter 14115 of May 27th last, relative to the employment of Mr. Zaphiro in the East Africa Protectorate, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a copy of a letter from Mr. Zaphiro, and to enquire what replies the Earl of Cromer would wish to be returned to the points raised therein.

In regard to the third paragraph of Mr. Zaphiro's letter, I am to refer to Mr. Thesiger's Despatch No. 6 of January 31st, last, forwarded in my letter of 4th of February 1916, and to your communication 4551 of March 1st. A.M.

Sir E. Grey has already informed Mr. Thesiger that Mr. Zaphiro's travelling expenses between Addis Ababa and Jimuti have been sanctioned. See your letter

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your despatch No. 18835 dated the 2nd of June 1910 and will go to the

Government Enclosure you will see an application to

allow me to travel by rail and boat across the Trans-

African Protectorate on the eastern frontier of Abyssinia

and I hope in your despatch you will give me a guarantee

of 10/- per week, for 17 days, to cover my expenses

and the cost of tickets on the railway and boat.

It is not permitted to add another 10/- a week, so that to 20/-

10/- a day (which I have been told) is the maximum

to include in a travel in Abyssinia. It may be permitted

to draw your attention to the fact that you expect me

to transport heavy difficulties over great distances

which must be done with great difficulty.

Please do not mind the result of this letter too

as it is only a rough sketch of what I want to do.

John Edward Grey, Esq., M.P., can write to me at

help His Majesty's Minister there to settle finally the frontier question. I am leaving England on the 7th July next, the date on which my leave expires. I have received my salary up to 24th April last, and respectfully request that I may now be permitted to draw my pay to that date, and also an advance on account of my expenses for the return journey to Adis Ababa may be granted.

My expenses from Adis Ababa to London amount to the sum of £150. I have asked Captain the Honourable Wilfred Thesiger who informed me that he has already written to you about it.

I have served His Majesty's Government for 6 years in a most unhealthy and difficult country, after which time four months leave was granted to me, I therefore most respectfully request that the above amount may be sanctioned to me, considering the small pay I have had all this time, I can ill afford to lose such an enormous sum.

your letter No. 21307/1c of the 20th of
June relating to the employment of Mr.
Zapiro by the Government of the East

Africa Protectorate

2. I am to request that Mr. Zapiro
may be informed that the subsi-
dies allowance of £10/- a day
which he has hitherto received will not
be paid when he comes into receipt of

the new appointment of £400 a year with
travelling allowance on the ordinary

scale of a District Commissioner, and
to suggest that Mr. Zaphiro should be so informed
The Crown Agents for the

Colonies are being instructed to issue to Mr. Zaphiro pay at the rate of £200 a year from the 25th of April up to and including the 6th July next.

Lord Crews regrets that he is not prepared to ask the Treasury to sanction the payment of Mr. Zaphiro's travelling expenses between Jibuti and this country. Treasury sanction was obtained for granting to him travelling expenses incurred on the journeys between Adis Ababa and Jibuti on the ground that this was a privilege granted to the members of His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa.

It appears that Mr. Zaphiro came to England for his own purposes and not under instructions from the Government and his Lordship therefore feels that

that a case for the payment of further travelling expenses could not be made out. The Crown Agents have, therefore,

been instructed that they may make available to Mr. Zaphiro an advance of one month's salary at the rate of £200 a year on his personal security or of two month's salary on collateral security, any such advance to be re-paid on his return to East Africa by such instalments and in such manner as the Governor of the East African Protectorate may direct.

Mr. Zaphiro should be instructed to apply to the Crown Agents whose address is 4 Whitehall Gardens, London, S.W., for the payment of the sum in question.
