In reply to your letter 22295 of the 26th ultimo relative to Mr. Zaphiro's claim for a subsistence allowance while living at Adis Ababa, I am directed, by Secretary of State to state, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that a special allowance at the rate of Ten shillings a day is made for officers serving in His Majesty's Legation at Adis Ababa, in order to assist them in defraying the heavy cost of living in that place.

With reference to paragraph 3 of your letter under reply, I am to add that the items of the claim put forward by Mr. Zaphiro appear to be reasonable and are such as would be allowed in the case of officers in the employment of the Foreign Office.

At 10:00 AM on October 10, 1940,

about 1000 feet N.E. of Lake Victoria, Uganda, I observed the following observations:

(1) There appeared to be no seasonal or tide agreement of 1940 or origin. It was noted that as those fishes were at about the same time in the river to the east of Lake Victoria, and to the south of the Lake.
