MILITARY INFORMATION

ADMIRAL ARABIA.

19 AUGUST 1916.

Sir,

I have the honor to inform you that Mr. Cull came to see me yesterday to tell me of a telegram which he had received from Rome, asking what the arrangement was which had been made between the British and Italian Governments and the Abyssinian Government for the partition of the country around Eritrea.

I assure the Sir that I have had spoken with Signor Martini, Governor of Tripoli, and that the latter has understood him to say that he told us that no arrangement had been made with the Italian Government regarding the subdivision of the Eritrean, and that when such arrangements were completed by the Italian Government would commence operations.

I cannot but think that my Sir, for some misunderstanding on Signor Martini's part, has given an incorrect report to Captain Harry of the British Consulate at Tripoli, than I have laid particular stress on the necessity of obtaining the co-operation of the Italian and Abyssinian local authorities on the north and east of the Eritrean district in order to prevent these tribes from attacking the Sultanate when faced by our troops and skirt safety in foreign territory, a step which could prevent us from obtaining permanent results from our operations.

Count Collx, who agrees with me on the desirability
of some such combination, told me that when the occasion ~~arrived~~
he would be ~~quite~~ ready to advise his Government in this matter.
Matters however have gone no further, and I am unaware whether
the Protectorate have finally decided to take steps to secure
the Durhan, or if so, when they intend to commence operations.

To the Abyssinians I have made no mention of the sub-
ject, and should not think it advisable to do so until the
very last moment. They are however anxious to get back a
large number of the Per Afgha who have deserted over to the
Meriong country with some 400 rifles, and could, I think, be
induced to assist us by watching their side of the Dawa River
if necessary.

With regard to the proposed attack on the Southern
frontier, I have not been able to do any thing further owing to
the illness of Captain H. F. Langbridge.

I have not sent the letter mentioned in my despatch
Number 1 of the 4th of August requesting Captain H. F. Langbridge not
to cross the road line up to the Meriong at foot of the mountain
whereas regarding the proposed attack which I
described in the letter, and have so far given no sufficient
assurances regarding the possible arrival there before
midnight of this day.

It was difficult to do so as I refused their request
altogether without arousing Abyssinian suspicion that we intended to use
them. In addition to the previous despatch
I also addressed to Captain H. F. Langbridge a copy of the information
from Captain Hoffstet showing that the Abyssinian rebels are
now in possession of both the Meriong and the Dawa, and that
they had been driving the British forces from the
frontier, and I can assure you that our men were with
them to our frontier forces until I have received assurances
from Captain H. F. Langbridge that they do not intend to violate

violating our territories.
