My dear Cox,

East Africa Customs Ordinance &c. French protests.

Would you look at the C.O. letter of Sep. 28 10 asking us whether we think the articles objected to by the French are in violation of their treaty rights. I should like some time or other to discuss the matter with you; I think if the Colonial Office want to maintain the provisions in question, it will be for you people to show that those provisions do not conflict with French Treaty rights, and I trust you can only do this by showing that the contents of the sections in which the French object (54, 55, 56, 126, 131, 141, 199, 200, 201.) are normal and ordinary provisions in Central law, which do not abrogate the French right under art. 2 of the Treaty of 1844 to enter, to proceed to Duria unopposed, the right under art. 3 to be free from local visitation without general intervention, and the right under art. 10 to import from all further, pay after paying the amount fixed by that article.

If you leave it to us, the decision is likely to be adverse.
