Sir:-

With reference to your letter of the 2nd June I am

directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to state, for the

information of Mr. Secretary Marcourt, that a telegram

has been received from His Majesty's Agent and Consul

General in Zanziger, stating that at his request Judge

Murison proceeded to Nairobi to discuss with Judge Barth

the question of the mainland properties of the Sultan.

Judge Murison, however, felt obliged to return at once

to Zanziger as Judge Barth had instructions to make no

compromise on any point but adhere to the strict letter

of the law in every case, and both judges were of opinion

that at least two months would be occupied in dealing with

the matter on those lines and examining the hundreds of

witnesses whose evidence would be required to determine the

ownership of the mainstaining properties.

Sir E. Grey trusts that Mr. Secretary Marcourt will

not likely to insist on this course. He would suggest that
the judges should have instructions allowing them to
settle by compromise the ownership of the smaller proper-
