

With reference to my despatch No. 120 of the 16th. instant relative to the rising in German East Africa, I have the honour to transmit to Your Lordship the accompanying translations of two paragraphs which appeared on the 14th. October in the "Deutsch-Ostafrikanische Zeitung" a weekly journal published at Dar-es-Salaam.

The one refers to the methods of fighting adopted by the insurgents, and the other to the despatch of a military expedition to Songea.

The 8th. Company has returned to Dar-es-Salam from the region of Kisidju after having broken up the insurgents. Bezirksschutzmann Boeder remains still with the Police in the South. Here as at Kilwa the insurgents are dressed in black (Kaniki) and carry black flags. Their war-slogans everywhere consist of the words "Maji, Maji" (water, that is Holy Water). The enemy never hold their ground before the Askaris, but withdraw at once back into the bush in order to reappear (?) in another place. The configuration of the country and the manner in which the insurgents fight render it impossible to engage them in a pitched battle. The traits of perseverance and constant success which distinguish individual detachments of the troops, will nevertheless without doubt ultimately attain its object, although perhaps slowly.
