the whole country was in a state of unrest; and that the tribes in the neighbourhood of Daressalam were only prevented from taking the offensive, partly by the presence of a large number of well-armed furopeans in the town, and partly by the want of a capable leader, it was said that Mbaruk bin Reshid, of Mazrui rebellion fame, had been offensive the foreur and declined it, and that he had subsequently, as a precautionary measure, been surmoned by the Government to Daressalam and ordered tooremain there.
