

I spoke to Mr. Green of the Foreign Office and
regarding the various financial returns which are now coming
to his office from the new Protectorate, and he informed
me that they were sent for information of the
Secretary of State only, and not to assist other members of
the Government direct from a Protectorate. Mr. Green
told me that, by Army Office system, the returns
were sent home monthly, and also quarterly, in addition
to the Comptroller's annual account, and that the monthly
returns are regarded by the GO as principally of use

I notice that the returns now being forwarded to the Colonial Office do not correspond in each case with the returns prescribed in the Instructions to Officers in the Colonial Service, but this was presumably right half a dozen of years ago.

The only action that appears to have been taken for a few years is reported by the recent correspondence with the Treasury under which the abstract of Total Revenue and Expenditure mentioned in Sect. 105(4) (B) of the Instructions for Officers in the Colonial Service is to be sent each year, commencing with the year 1904-5, to the Treasury for information only, and I have accordingly applied to the Treasury for copies relating to the annual abstracts in the case of the East African Protectorate (26744) and of Uganda (26745). The money received, however, will be referred to in a report at the beginning of the year, and it can I think be fairly taken as not containing any statement of "income" to the Dept.

The only action the officers to be called for on time papers to be reported by the next consignment will be during which the abstract of Total Revenue and Expenditure reaches us. Sect. 105(4) (1) of the instructions for Officers in the Colonial Service is to the effect and goes, commencing with the year 1904-5, to be ready for information only, and I have accordingly drafted to the Secretary for Colonies, entry 42 Annual Abstracts in the case of the East African Protectorate (26740) and of Uganda (26745). The remaining nations, however, are in papers referred to as a group of six which can I think be partly taken up, no doubt, by other papers of interest to the Dptt.
