Acting Sergeant Madden and Constable Reilly have been informed as directed in Colonial Office letter of 2nd ultimo and they have been shown the regulations as to pensions and leave of absence in the East Africa Protectorate. They will be ready to sail about the 1st June, with regard to paragraph 3 of the letter of the 2nd ultimo. I understand from the Foreign Office letter of 1st January, 1905, that the pensions of these men on their final retirement from the Protectorate Service will be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the Superannuation Act of 1892, and that, under the rules framed by the Treasury on 10th July, 1892, under Section 1 of that Act, the portion of pension to be paid in respect of their Service in the Royal Irish Constabulary will be charged to Imperial funds. For this purpose, however, it is necessary that the Treasury should, ~~as pointed out~~ ~~the Deputy Inspector General's~~ issue a declaration that the fund of the East Africa Protectorate is a public fund within the meaning of Section 4 of the Superannuation Act of 1892. From the regulations issued by the Foreign Office dated 1st September, 1900, it would seem that this has already been done.
