The capital of £5000 of which some £3000 has
apparently been paid up and spent on preliminary in-
vestigations.

It would be concesionaires are
proposed in answer's letter of 7th October. It appears
that the Board of Trade were consulted as to their
status and reported favourably upon it. I have heard
well from other sources of Messrs Woodhouse as old
established tea and produce brokers.

The Foreign Office have already referred these ~~against~~
proposals to us and in our letter of the 25th July ~~1906~~
threw cold water on it, on the ground of vagueness
and want of financial guarantees.

The Foreign Office accordingly did not commit
themselves in any way, and we have quite a free hand.

We originally asked for 600 square miles of land
on lease for 99 years, rent free for 5 years, and
then at £1 a square mile with right to convert into
freehold at 8d per acre and power to sublet.

The Commissioner recommended not more than 200 square
miles, at a higher rent, for 50 years only, with right
of renewal for a further 49 years, and that the right
to convert into freehold should be limited as to area
and

and should be granted at 1/- per acre - and that the power to sublet should only be given with the consent of the Commissioner.

Mr. ... (The East Afr. Mandate were granted 500 square miles or more for 50 years - seven years free - and then at £1 per square mile and right of purchase at £1 per acre).

This, however, was recognised as being an exceptional case and not to be made a precedent).

The block asked for consisted of the land for 10 miles on each side of the Tana River from Kidori (140 miles from the mouth) northward.

Very little is known, according to Sir C. Elliot, of the upper waters of the Tana but so far as known they are fertile as the river overflows its banks like the Nile, only twice in the year ~~on tidal force~~: ~~which is rather~~ ~~at the time of the flood~~. Our reply ~~re~~ offered a lease of not more than 100 square miles for for a longer term than 50 years, rent free for the first 5 years, and afterwards at a yearly rent of £2, or sq. mile, with a right to convert up to 25 square miles into freehold at one rupee per acre. We told them if they accepted these terms an agreement would be made to grant them a lease when a Company had been formed and a certain proportion of its capital paid up under conditions of course the application to the purposes of the Concession.

~~We did not mention any particular sum, and they now suggest a sum of £5,000 as sufficient.~~

Now the terms which we are offering, to people who want a small area of land for cultivation in the rural part of the Peatland, are these:

500 acres per plot, for £50/- per acre.

On a long lease term, say 21 years, for £50/- per acre.

A sum of £25/- is deducted from £50/-, and at a rental of £1/- per acre, the amount for the first year would be £25/-.

The following are the points which I have in view:

(a)

(a) that 500 acres is a reasonable amount for a family of six persons, and are content to cultivate for fifteen years, and are content to pay £50/- per acre.

In view of this, little consideration is given to what these people 100 square miles of land, and as they are only prepared to spend £5000 in all, £50/- per acre £25/- they have already spent on equipment.

I am inclined to reply that it would be difficult to answer the question for Mr. J. Hallion to state whether it is possible to cultivate such a large area as 100 square miles on £5000 in all, £50/- per acre £25/- available capital.

and as far as the question of the cost of labour is concerned, I am inclined to say that it would be difficult to estimate the cost of labour for 100 square miles of land, as there would be a great variation in the cost of labour.

For example, if we attempted to improve the 100 square miles of land on the same conditions, and in view of the various other reports that have explored the question of value, a further area of 10,000 acres might be granted on the same conditions.

Add that in order to form an opinion on this subject it will be necessary for them to forward to us for transmission to the Commissioner the map and reports referred to in their letter P&L 10/10.


