



185. KAROOLI, a KAROOLI Chief, living near Mount KAROOLI, states that he has seen HAMIDI raiders returning with cattle through the forest S. of that mountain. The parties usually consisted of from 3 to 8 men whom he thinks are KAROOLI.
186. When our MASAI Levies were paid off by Mr. ISAAC at MOLO their Chiefs expressed great satisfaction at their rewards & the manner of distribution.
187. The KAROOLI Chief ARAB CELIO states that the policeman murdered near LOMBIANE was killed by KAROOLI who used ARAB SONGO & ARAB SHOGO. The last are still alive and are hiding in the forest.

On the 23rd October a base camp was formed at KONGONI whence a wide extent of the surrounding country was thoroughly searched by Flying Column whose patrols pushed almost to HIRKIT mountain.

Continual efforts were made to communicate with other Columns but-with one exception without success.

On the 28th October Lieut.-Col. GOMBE notes that "a good many bands of rebels have undoubtedly crossed our patrols road. I feel certain, have been driven towards other Columns. whilst others have escaped to the North of SIKOKOT and a considerable number to KAPCHI, a few towards KAPKAN & KIPORI. Many of rebels prevent us from moving further from our base, moreover I think that in order to comply with the spirit of instructions issued by the C.G.P.P. I should commence my return journey towards KAPCHI at an early date."

The Column reached KAPCHI on the 3rd November and took up its base as ordered.

Throughout all operations it is to be noted that patrols were well pushed out, guides absent or country covered and that all roads were kept wide and dry.

The question of the site of future NARDE reserve is being discussed between the Officer Commanding Field Force, the Chief Political Officer and the Acting Deputy Commissioner of the Protectorate. Attention is drawn to Mr. FOWLER's memorandum of November 8th where-in he puts forward an out-line of his proposals on this subject. Pages 2 & 3 of this Memo. give the bases from which a consideration of this question should be approached. After discussing and eliminating the suggestions to confine the NARDE to the LIMBA and HENT country (X 5) and MARYO and MUTHI area (X 8) Mr. FOWLER gives it as his opinion that the reserve should be on the S.E. & N. slopes of Mount SIMON (X 7) which are fertile, sparsely populated and away from the probable line of colonisation.

Peculiar attention is directed to X 12 in which the ruin of the NARDE tribe is traced to the really interior economy which gave the MAJAH or young warrior class a motive for murder and theft. In X 16 stress is laid on the necessity of so crushing the tribe by native operations that their consent to the move into a reserve will be readily given.

Important is to be attached to the suggestions put forward pages 16, 17, 18, & 19 that in the Reserve the NARDE should be permitted to live in his villages and

- (b) That their readiness to do this will be a test of the success of operations,

Mr. MORLEY lays stress on the fact that the Maori while always ready to profess willingness to obey orders meet all definite demands for obedience with a "non possumus" and in the past, by spinning out negotiations, have always secured by their evasiveness and shifty-ness, and that they are people dealing with almost brutal firmness.

Other suggestions as to a reserve which have been under consideration are:

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This morning I Coy 2nd K.A.R. arrived at LIMSWA from KAVASHA on completion of survey duty to a herd of lost stock sent there from the RAVINE for sale. This Company will be distributed in posts of 5 rifles in 2 gang huts between Mile 524 & m. 565 to protect maintenance gangs. No other troops on the L. of C. are available for the bringing of pressure to bear to move the KAMBLING by pushing strong patrols from their posts.

The G.C. N.Y.P.P. returned to Headquarters from KERICHO.

Arrangements made for Railway protection in consultation with the Asst. Dist. Engineer of the Railway and the G.C. L. of C. who came to LIMSWA for the purpose.
