301. ARAN NANGI states that he had tried unsuccessfully to get his people to come in. About 50 head of cattle were seen in his village.

302. ARAN NANGI's headmen were interviewed by Lieut. ... They stated that they would not come in. Some four hundred to five hundred head of cattle were seen in the valley. This is probably due to other clans sending their cattle to graze in this valley as it is close to forest into which cattle grazing here can be quickly driven.

303. C.C. SOBA reports that on the 30th he saw ARAN NANGI who stated that his people would not come in.

304. Capt HONKTON, Collector at LINDWA Station, reports that the clans near him, notably ARAN NANGI's people are willing to move into the Reserve.

Lieut. WILSON's report and diary cover the period from the 5th to the 17th November during which period the V Column moving from KISUMU on the 5th operated through MORAPA HILL-SOUTH KAPWANGI-IBOII-KADNOSI-KYANGORI & ALDAI to WANDI FORGE.

The result of these operations were
1004 head of cattle captured
800 sheep & goats do
100 enemy killed
at a loss to the Column of
2 NADAI levies & 1 porter killed
5 M & V 3rd Lt. & Co., 2 NADAI & 2 followers wounded.

Lieut WILSON reports that although as a rule the enemy offered but slight resistance yet on several occasions they fought in a most determined manner, notably on the KYANGORI-WANDI marches, at ALDAI and N. of KADNOSI in the KAPWANGI reserve.

Attention is drawn to entry No 25 of 12/11/00 in G.O. V which describes an affair at ALDAI in which 70 parties under Capt. WILSON, (Com. Coy) were surrounded by a large body of spearmen and compelled to retire.

Unless the ALDAI Chiefs make their submission on our return to WANDI FORGE this section of the tribe must be expelled from the tribe and further punishment visited on it.

November: Staff Diary No 1 Column 1900.

The I Column (less levies) assembled at MORAPAI on the morning of the 17th October and marched on "TWIN HILL WAYS" on the Nairobi road where the following Officer reported himself with the NADAI Chief KANAKIA levies

October 20 I went to the road, KONGONI-KUMINGI, in the GUAA...

On the 21st October the Column performed a night march from SIKIKI with object of attacking the enemy in KAPCHEPINDI at dawn but the death of the LAISON on the 19th had alarmed this district and many homes were found to be deserted.

On the 23rd October a base camp was formed at KONGONI whence a wide extent of the surrounding country was thoroughly searched by Flying Column whose patrols pushed almost to SIKWIT mountain.

Continual efforts were made to communicate with other Columns but with one exception without success.

On the 28th October Lieut-Col GORHAM notes that "a good many herds of cattle have undoubtedly evaded our patrols, none, I feel certain, have been driven towards other Columns, whilst others have escaped to the North of SIKWIT and a considerable number to KUMINGI, a few towards KAMBA & KISTONI. Want of ration prevent us from moving further from my base, unless over I think that in order to comply with the spirit of instructions issued by the C.O.F. I should commence my return journey towards NAYIN at an early date."

The Column reached NAYIN on the 3rd November and took up posts ordered.

Throughout the operations it is to be noted that patrols were well pushed out, a wide extent of country covered and that all posts were well garrisoned.

The question of the site of future HANDEI reserve is being discussed between the Officer Commanding Field Force, the Chief Political Officer and the Acting Deputy Commissioner of the Protectorate. Attention is drawn to Mr. HOBLEY's memorandum of November 8th where-in he puts forward an out-line of his proposals on this subject. Paras 2 & 3 of this Memo. give the bases from which a consideration of this question should be approached. After discussing and eliminating the suggestions to confine the HANDEI to the MURKA and MURSI country (X 5) and HANDEI and MURSI area (X 6) Mr. HOBLEY gives it as his opinion that the reserve should be on the S. & N. slopes of Mount ELON (X 7) which are fertile, sparsely populated and away from the probable line of colonisation.

Particular attention is directed to X 12 in which the fact of the HANDEI tribe is traced to its really interior country which gave the MURSI an opportunity class a motive for murder and theft.
