

My Lord,



I have received Your Lordship's despatch No. 90 of
the 12th instant, enclosing a copy of Mr. Barton Wright's
report on the proposed new arrangements for the
Land Department, and intimating the terms upon which a
new Commissioner is sought to be appointed. Such an
officer will need a large staff which would be of incalculable
value to the Colony.

Referring to Your Lordship's despatch No. 90,

Under the new arrangements Mr. Barton Wright will
remain as Land Officer in charge of the Land Department,
which will be separated from the Survey Department as soon
as Mr. G. Smith arrives, working under the guidance and
control of the Land Commissioner.

It is necessary now to appoint an Assistant Land
Officer, on a salary of three hundred pounds per annum for
which provision has been made in the estimates and I would
ask if a suitable man can be obtained at Home on that
salary.
