2. The first of these memoranda is a resume of reports furnished by my orders by Dr Macdonald and Dr Walker, the second an explanation submitted by Dr Macdonald of the wrong date of the death entered in the Registration Book and of the fees charged by him for the consultation while Miss Heath was in hospital.

3. I entirely concur with the views expressed by the Principal medical officer, 16th instant, from

4. I much regret the whole —
occurrence which appears to me
to reflect on the medical
profession in East Africa. The
medical officers of this —
Protectorate are, as a rule,
indefatigable on their attendance
on outside patients, and, with
one or two exceptions, do not
charge fees, though entitled
to do so.

5. I have caused to be com-
municated to Dr Macdonald
through the Principal Medical
Officer, the sense of my grave
displeasure at the incidents

above referred to, which would
not have arisen had Dr Mac-
donald acted with the ordinary
care required by an officer
in his position.

With reference to the circumstances attending the death of Miss Ethel Heath and the subsequent illness of Mrs Heath.

Mr Macdonald states that on the afternoon of September 9th he landed the S.S. "Reichstag" in Mombasa harbour, and was informed by the Captain that Miss Ethel Heath was very ill, in fact dying. He walked along the deck to where she was, and found the ship's doctor and a German steward in attendance on her, and that, practically as he arrived, she expired.

The Captain and doctor being questioned, both stated that the deceased lady had taken an overdose of morphine, had, in fact, committed suicide, and the latter gave Mr Macdonald a certificate written in German to this effect. This certificate was taken to the German vice Consulate, where a translation of it was obtained in the presence of the Assistant Deputy Inspector of Police - Mr Faran, and himself (copy attached).

Dr Macdonald further states that he at once reported the death to Mr Faran A.D.S.P. and before leaving the ship, asked to see Mrs Heath and found her so ill, that he had some difficulty in understanding her. He, however, broke the news of her daughter's death, and promised to get a woman to assist her on her voyage. At about 6.30 that evening, on receipt of a message from the Assistant Treasurer, Mr Powter, he visited Mrs Heath who had landed and was at the Hotel Cecil. Next morning (8th) owing to the attendant (who had been provided by Mr Powter) being unsatisfactory, one of the Government Nursing Sisters was sent for to replace her. The patient's condition became critical, Dr Macdonald called Dr Wiggins in consultation.

It should be noted that in connection with the circumstances surrounding the death of Miss Heath, Dr Macdonald acted at the time with propriety; he accepted the statement of the ship's surgeon and doctor, without once reported the matter to Mr Feran.

As regards his "absolute indifference", his record of visits, the summoning of outside advice, his effort to procure an attendant, and his statement to Mrs Heath on board the "Reichenbach" that if a woman were not procurable, he would himself go and do what he could for her while in harbour, prove his loyalty and care for his patient.

The delay in dates in the first account rendered, shows a want of regard to money matters which is regrettable.

The other error in registering the proper date of the birth at the Registry Office, Bombay, is a more serious matter, and inexcusable.

As regards the question of fees, it appears from P.O. despatch No. 162 of Jul. 1st 1898, that Government Medical Officers are entitled to charge fees from private persons treated in private hospitals. Dr Macdonald should therefore have omitted fees charged for consultation while Mrs Heath was in hospital, from his bill.

There died just now on board of the S.S. "Reichs-
krona" Ethel Death who was together with her
son a first class passenger. My diagnosis was
hysteria and, that this was right, was stated to
the patient herself the day before yesterday. I
have taken her under care and inspection.

This morning I was called at half past five.
Death is sure to have tried a suicide this night.
We no doubt that she tried to commit the suicide
taking morphium. Her alimentation during the last
days has been pitiful. She lived on champagne, soda-
water, port wine, and morphium. I fed her this morn-
ing with a rebang through the nose, she took some
filled with three eggs and kept it well. Besides I
plied camphor solution and faradischen (+) stream
in necessary way.

I had hoped to bring her through, but her nutrit-
ion too bad and the poison she took, was too much.

"I had nothing to do with the registration of Miss Heath's death. I handed over the case to the Police, who no doubt would take all steps in the matter. I signed the Registration book when sent to me filled up, even the cause of death was filled in - Morphinism - and I cannot after this lapse of time recall the date on which it was sent to me for signature, but I know it was a considerable number of days after the death of Miss Heath.

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
