My Lord,

With reference to my despatch No. 185 of April

last reporting on the over-working of the Judges of the High Court in this Protectorate and suggesting in the event of a third Judge being appointed that a Court of Appeal might be established on the Mainland instead of in Zanzibar, I have the honour to inform your Lordship that with no Assistant Crown Advocate it has been found necessary to retain, at a cost of fifty pounds, the services of Messrs. Mead, Byron and Harrison, Solicitors, to appear for the Protectorate Government in three cases which are now being heard in the Appellate Court.
