Sir,

With reference to the letter which was handed to me on the 10th instant in which you inform me that you recently met with the British Consul at Mombasa, the name of the prisoner named McLeish, who is serving a term of imprisonment in which he was sentenced last year for an offence committed by him in the State of Kenya, I have requested by Colonel Hayes-Sadler to inform you that he has made enquiries with regard to the prisoner's state of health and has been informed by the officer of the prison in which he has been detained that his health has considerably improved since he was first imprisoned.

As, however, McLeish appears to be anxious about his health, he has been at Mombasa some months, and will be sent to Nairobi where he will serve the remainder of his imprisonment. This step was taken, as Colonel Hayes-Sadler has already informed you, before the receipt by him of your telegram of the 10th instant.

His Majesty's Commissioner observes that the fact of McLeish being an American citizen has never been mentioned to him, and that he is not aware of any arrangements which would be made for his removal to his own country, and he sees no reason which would justify his releasing him before the expiration of the term of his imprisonment, to which he has been sentenced.

I have the honor to forward for your approval a draft of a Bill for amending the East African Youngly Ordinance 1904.

The proposed amendments relate mainly with the penalties which may be imposed by the Courts of the Provinces of the Colony and the East African Ordinance.

The draft of the Principal Ordinance is intended to make provision for the punishment of a person who, and to give the Commissioner power to cause to be authorized holding servants and other persons to remove a nuisance which the person required by law has failed to remove.

The rules regarding holding and servants and other persons are also amended unless each party is shown to be Ordinance.
