MEMORANDUM.

This stuff was found at the base of Dungji Hill (Latitude 8° 2' 13" and Longitude East 36° 54') in a rocky River bed. There are a few springs of fresh water underneath the cliff, from which the stuff issues. Colonel G. Smith found it some weeks ago. The cliff is about seventy feet high and overhanging, and the deposit bubbles out, but so slowly, that there is no visible movement.

I am enclosing 2 photographs of the place (they are marked with numbers on their backs). To the left of the lighter-colored head in No. 1 is a deposit and bubbles can be seen on the face of the cliff to the left of the Nakai.

At the bottom of the cliff are several tons of the stuff, on which the men are stamping in illustration No. 2 and the black discolourment of the cliff in streaks is visible.

The place is much frequented by baboons and small antelopes, which probably accounts for the smell of the stuff.

There are no native inhabitants in that part, with the exception of roving bands of Nakai and 'Ndopobo.

Water is scarce and there is none within ten miles of that village.

In Ngogolish Hill (about Latitude South 1° 58' and Longitude East 36° 57'), there are cliffs somewhat similar to Dungji, and should the material prove valuable, it might be worth while sending them for more.
