- with reference to our recent conversations regarding the use of stamps for purpose of bringing to account of charges paid for telegrams, and also in connection with the collection of Customs Duty on parcels, it appears that the object desired would be facilitated if the distribution of stamps were made from this Office. In fact this seems to be an essential preliminary to any such alteration as I wish to pring about.
- 2. The distribution of stamps direct from the Beneral Post Office would also seem to present other advantages in connection with renewals of stamp stock, and the ready and more convenient execution of reglisitions for issue. At present I am responsible for the maintenance of a safisfactory supply of stamps, all ough " a main stock is not actually in a enstody Theoreti ally I have every facility necessary for this purpose in the periodical accounts which are rendered from your Office to mine, showing the quantities un hand. But the higher value stamps are averprinted for Judicial and other purposes of which I have no adequate in fination. These, therefore, the issues . . all purposes are arranged from tile frice those facilities for rauging the prospective requirements which, in view of my responsibilities, I consider that I should possess.
- 3. For these reasons I should be glad if you could see your way to acquissoe in a proposal that the half st exist stemps to be kept at the denoral Post Office, and a tracksferred, together with the safe in which they are contained, at an early date.

I may add that the procedure suggested was followed in British Central Africa where, owing to the greater time occupied in obtaining renewals from London, the value of the stamps held in the country was much greater than in the case of this Protectorate.

With reference to our recent conversation regarding adjustments of account that are desirable in congection with the use of postage stamps as receipt stamps the matter does not appear to be one which can be satisfactorily disposed of on the basis of any local statistics.

In the case of the United Kingdom and other Countries where previously to the employment of postage stamps for the collection of stamp duty chargeable upon receipted bills, Ac., receipt stamps had been in use, the statistics of the sale of such receipt stamps furnished a basis upon which the joint revenue subsequently collected by means of a combined postage and receipt stamp could be divided between the Project and Inland Revenue Authorities. Must Africa does ... t, nowever, furnish a parallel case.

When discussing this question recently with Sir Evan James, a late Director General of the Post Office of India, I gathered that when a combined postage and receipt stamp was introduced in India the adj staent was made on the basis of the old Postage and Inland Revenue returns. The relative proportions of the revenue accruing from postage and receipt stamps, when existed before the combination was made, were taken as a basis for the division of the revenue resulting from a combined stamp.

It would seem that some proportion should be fixed and it might perhaps be advisable to refer the matter to London in order to obtain particulars of the method of adjustment adopted when the use of a combined postage and receipt stamp was decided upon in the United Kingdom.
