Sir,

In returning herewith Foreign Office despatch No. 64 dated the 3rd February 1905 and enclosures, I have the honour to report as follows:-

The Babu was granted and availed himself of four months' leave on full pay from the 2nd July 1902 in accordance with the leave rules then in force, (a copy of the rules is enclosed) and should have returned to Africa on the 2nd November 1902. Instead of returning he wrote stating that he was ill and asked for an extension of two months. This letter was written on the 23rd October, a date which rendered it impossible for it to be received in Africa until several days after the expiration of his leave. It was actually received on the 11th November nine days after his leave had expired, and consequently any letter that might have been sent to him could hardly have reached him before the time due for his return on the two months extension asked for. No reply was however sent to him.

A second application, for a further period of two months, was written on December 16th, eighteen days only before he should have been back in Africa had the first extension been sanctioned, and received here on the 4th January 1903, two days after he should have rejoined

rejoined. This second period expired on the 2nd March, and a letter was sent to the Babu on the 19th January informing him that his case would be considered if he rejoined before the two months applied for had expired. This letter was neither acknowledged nor replied to.

A third application, dated the 15th February, was received on the 14th March (twelve days after the expiration of the second extension applied for) asking for a still further extension of two months. The medical certificate enclosed with the application is dated the 15th February and recommends two months' sick leave, not an extension of sick leave. This leave was granted, in fact this third application was not replied to, and nothing more was heard of him until he reported his return to Africa on the 30th April. He was then informed that as he had overstayed his leave by six months he forfeited his appointment.

The case may be summarised as follows:-

The applicant sent in three applications for extension of leave, all of which were written on dates which rendered it impossible to enable him to receive any reply before the dates on which he should have rejoined his appointment had expired.

He received a letter stating that the condition of the continuation of his appointment depended on his rejoining before the 2nd March. As he did not return by that date, and did not in any way, beyond sending a medical certificate recommending leave, endeavour to explain his absence, there is no reason whatever why the Babu should have thought his employment still open. He did not return to Africa until two days before the period last applied for and which was not mentioned had expired.

Two of the certificates granted do not state any nature of illness and the third gives general debility. They each, also, give a recommendation for two months, and are each signed by a different person and at a different place.

He did not sign a fresh agreement on the termination of his three years' agreement, so that the railway was under no obligation to re-employ him.

He was granted the four months' leave on the understanding that if he returned within that period he would be re-engaged. This he failed to do.

With regard to the man's claims -

Under paragraph 2 of rule 2 of the leave rules then in force, he forfeited half of his leave pay for failing to keep his engagement. This the applicant undoubtedly did, not only by frequent extensions which were not granted, but by an overstaying beyond the period referred to in the Manager's letter No. 200/87a dated 14th January 1903. He is not therefore due any balance of pay beyond the Rs. 200, i.e. one-half of his leave pay already received by him. Any extensions of leave are, and always have been granted without pay. The leave rules in force from 1st April 1903 a copy of which is enclosed with the petition do not apply to his case; they came into force after he had proceeded on leave.

Any expenses incurred in returning to Africa, or his subsequent return to India, were incurred by him with the full knowledge that the final date given for his case being considered was the expiration of the two months applied for on December 16th, i.e. March the 2nd. He therefore incurred them knowing there was no probability of their being refunded, and that there was no liability

on the part of the Railway to refund them. 194

I am therefore of the opinion that the Babu should be informed that his petition cannot be entertained.

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Sir, I have the honor to lay before you the following grievances for favor of your consideration and to deal with accordingly:—

That I signed an agreement for
service of Uganda Railway on the 31st July 1901
and served there to the entire satisfaction of
superior officer whom my services were laid (of
which I hold two with testimonials) and was so
much liked by him that they have been
pleased to retain my services for a
year and was granted 4 months
leave with effect from 30th July 1902 to 4th January
but to my great misfortune on my return to India
I fell ill, and became quite unable to resume
my duty in East Africa - The Doctor pronounced
me fit rest, and in accordance with instructions
advised I sent an application together with a
medical certificate of East Afric. Civil Surgeon to
District Engineer & Maintenance Division for an
extension of two months leave but accompanied
by a period of about 2 months would be given
again advised me to apply for an extension
of two months more, which I accordingly did
I applied for two months leave on service
the Registration receipts for both the leaves
enclosed.

After this application I received the attached
order from the Manager and Chief Engineer on
19th Feby (while I was at Agra in Medical
Institute for treatment) which means that
"he has granted my leave & not rejected" 1903
but I was sorry that I could not up to
time restore my health and hence submitted
application together with a medical certificate
a Professor for an extension of two months.
Thank God that the leave was not over
as yet that I reached Deoband on the 30th
April 1903 and reported myself to Dr. J.
Esq., Asstt. Engineer, 1st Maintenance Division
who gave me a pass to go to Deoband
report to Dist. Engineer and there he sent
to Haribali in Deoband & Chief Engineer's office
my arrival in the Country was 3 days before my
but to my great surprise on my reporting to
Manager, he passed on the order (attached)
on the 15th May 1903 in accordance it has not

"Bath Marshal Kaji, Dist. 1st Maintenance
is informed that having overstayed his
privilege leave by 6 months he forfeits his
appointment and all rights and privilege
appertaining to it"

Most submissively beg to bring
your kind notice that the above mentioned
order (I am afraid if I am not mistaken) is wrong
under the following reasons:-

J. J. A.

(1) That I have not been granted a leave, but stopped in India only for the purpose of health on the medical certificate of an authorized Doctor; and that the rules came in force during my absence on leave can never be applied on to me, of what I was not aware till I reached the Country.

(2) There was no dismissal order before going to Africa, and neither was made until after 15 days of my approach, but was consider on leave - hence I do not understand why my pay up to the time of my dismissal may not be given to me? 197

(3). On my Coming on privilege leave I was supplied with a return passage ticket of the Steamer and was not asked back till I remained on leave & hence it was most reasonable for me to go & report myself to the Manager of the Uganda Railway, Nairobi for orders - If my services were no longer required in the Railway the manager could very easily inform me to this effect and I would have not travelled to the Country; but as he did not do so it was his duty to return me to India on the Railway passage ticket (as per Agreement, clause attached herewith)

(4) When leave was sanctioned time I was paid up to 1st July which the steamer left Mombasa on the 3rd and I walked in the office of the 3rd July, but the

single reply, I most humbly and
respectfully beg to ask your favor to
kindly settle up my case, and do me
justice to me so that a British subject
may thus not be offended & oppressed.
