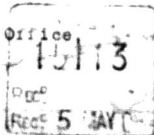

I have the honour to report that the Nursing Sisters of the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates have hitherto not been provided with a special uniform, each nurse having been permitted to wear the uniform of the hospital to which she belonged before joining the Protectorate service. As it is desirable that the nurses should all wear the same kind of dress, for the provision of which a sufficient sum of money has been provided, I have requested the Principal Medical Officer to furnish me with the details of a serviceable uniform. I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of the particulars submitted by Major Williams, which I think will be suitable, and which I hope will meet with your approval.
