In obedience to the instructions contained in Lord Lansdowne's telegram No. 80 of March 31st, I have the pleasure to transmit herewith two certified copies of the proceedings in the Wehner case, in the Magistrate's Court, the Sessions Court and the Appeal Court. The fees for copies amount to three hundred and eight rupees (twenty pounds, ten shillings and eight pence).
