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Mr. Nasarwangi, Dept of Public Works.

Recommend that the post of Subpt be abolished and that Mr. Nasarwangi be reduced on pension or gratuity.

(Minutes.)

Mr Head.

Mr Nasarwangi has been overpaid for the last two years, according to the Compt, and will now be paid £120 a year for the rest of his life for doing nothing at all.

The rate of his off^{er}, judging from Mr Attwadra's dep (para 2) is $\frac{16}{49}$ %, so that he has now served $10\frac{1}{2}$ years, not $9\frac{1}{2}$ as stated by the Compt - the final para of the dep.

Under dep 26 Oct, I prefer an off^{er} of 5% of the off^{er} of which 6 EAST is forced for after 7.0. Regd of 7/5/30, Nasarwangi would be entitled to an allow^{ance} on abolition of off^{er}, at the rate of $\frac{1}{6}$ for each year service, and $\frac{1}{6}$ plus an abolition allow^{ance} of $\frac{1}{6}$ of $\frac{1}{4}$ of his final off^{er} (£14,450 + £200 more result, $\frac{1}{6}$ of £15,250 = £130 per.

As the re organisation
of the Public Works Department

is now under consideration, I
have the honour to recommend
that the post of Public Works

Superintendent held by a

Parsee named Khansedji Nasarwanji

be

be abolished, and the holder
granted such pension or gratuity
as he may be entitled to.

2. Mr. Khansedj was gazetted as
Superintendent of Public Works
for the East Africa Protectorate
~~in 1896~~ his appointment being
sanctioned by the Foreign Office.
The pay was (after the first
six months) at the rate of
Rs 400/- mensem rising by
yearly increments of Rs 20/-
to Rs 600. As Mr. Khansedj
was paid the maximum
amount of the post in 1901, he
is in receipt of a salary of
Rs 7200 or £480 per annum,
and although no formal
sanction was apparently given
to his being granted a
house, he occupies a dwelling
which is rented at an additional
£ 40 per annum. I have the

his original appointment I

also enclose a copy of a letter

from the late Mr Bradbridge

referred to in the latter is

not on our archives.

3. Formerly when the Protectorate

was in its infancy Mr

Khansedji fulfilled all the

requirements of Superintendent

of the Public Works Department

but as long ago as 1900 it

was found that he did

not possess the necessary

training and ability to

cope with the increasing work,

and the late Mr Baly was

appointed Director early

1901 on a salary of Rs 600

per

per annum. Two years later Mr Farmer was appointed Assistant Director at £400 per annum. Since then other trained European Engineers have been engaged and are receiving from £250 to £400 per annum. When Mr Tan was appointed, Sir Eric Barrington in a telegram dated March 26th 1903 (copy enclosed) questioned the course of paying £600 a month to an Asiatic and I am informed that it was soon then considered advisable to dispense with Mr Khawaja's services, but as he was on the permanent staff and had been gazetted as an "officer" in an order of precedence dated December 15th 1899, the legal adviser gave as his opinion that his retirement could only be effected by paying him a gratuity or pension. In consequence he was allowed to remain on in the Protectorate service and now occupies the anomalous position of an overseer on £400 (plus £40 house rent) whilst his

his immediate superiors are drawing considerably less.

4. With regard to Mr Khansedji's ability, Mr Ross reports that he is not up to the requirements of the Department and is ~~unable~~ to do better work than was done during the construction of the ~~M~~gawa Railway by ~~Asian~~ overseers who were ~~Asian~~ engaged in India on Rs 200 or Rs 250 a month. His usefulness as an Engineer is much less than that of the European Engineers of the Public Works Department.

5. I have the honour to suggest that, as we have no further use for Mr Khansedji's services, the post of Superintendent of Public Works be abolished and that he be permitted to retire on pension or leave the service with a generous retiring bonus. Regard should, I think, be

be had for his 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ years' service
in the Protectorate and in
view of the fact that his
appointment will be abolished,
I am of opinion that it would
be well to allow him a
pension.

Sir,

With reference to your despatch No. 212 of the 25th October last, you will have seen from the copy of the [redacted] from the Treasury enclosed in my despatch No. 62 of the 14th instant, that the Lords Commissioners have agreed to the appointment on the staff of the East Africa Protectorate of a regular Director (Parsee) of Public Works and a sum of two hundred and fifty pounds has been inserted in the estimates for 1896-1897 for the purpose. But in accordance with the wish of the Treasury this salary should be fixed and paid in Rupees, at the maximum rate of four hundred rupees by twenty to six hundred a month.

Their Lordships observe that from three hundred rupees to three hundred and fifty rupees a month is not an uncommon rate for a man of this class in India.

I have the honour to report, with reference to Your Lordship's despatch No. 66 of 20th February last that I have engaged Mr. Gursetji, assistant to Mr. Basaji, who as Your Lordship is aware is Minister of Public Works at [redacted], to be Director of Public Works for this Protectorate on probation for six months at three hundred and fifty rupees a month, and have promised to recommend to Your Lordship that if he is permanently appointed he shall receive an increase of fifty rupees a month.

Mr. Gursetji is highly spoken of by Sir Lloyd Mathews who brought him over from India and has the advantage over a stranger of knowing something already of the country and people. He has now entered upon his duties which he took up on the 16th instant, and will proceed at once with the building of the official residences already sanctioned by the Treasury.

He has asked for a house and office allowance of fifty pounds or eight hundred rupees a year and this I think we may be able, should Your Lordship approve of it, to bring within this year's estimates.
