In continuation of my letters No.27 of the 9th ultime (informing you of Mr. H. Oliver's resignation) and No.30 of the 12th of July (recommending Mr. W. J. Evans of Natal for appointment as Postal Clerk and Telegraphist vice Mr. Oliver) I have now the honour to recommend that Mr. G. P. Lewis, a Postal Clerk and Telegraphist of this Department, be promoted to the vacant appointment of Postmaster, Salary £.200 x £.10 to £.300 per annum, which it was originally proposed to confer upon Mr. Oliver, vide my letter No.10 of the 18th of May last.

2. Although Mr. Lewis has only 8 months service with this Department he has been continuously employed in Post and Telegraph work since 1899, and his experience is generally superior to that asked for in the case of candidates for appointment to his present grade of Postal Clerk and Telegraphist. He is, moreover, nearly 37 years of age and is probably quite well qualified by age and experience as any Officer in the Imperial Post Office would be likely to apply for the post.
