Sir:

With reference to the correspondence re the non-recovery of advances made to the Porters of the Mandi Field Force, I have the honour to forward the following statement in reply.

From the correspondence I understand that,

- (a) It is alleged that I neglected to take proper precautions for the correct issue of pay to the porters engaged for the R.F.F. during the time that I held the appointment of S.O.(Q.M.G.) to the force.
- (b) This neglect led to the non-recovery of a sum of Rs.383, (difference between money advanced to and recovered from porters enlisted for the R.F.F.)
- (c) Unless I can render a satisfactory explanation on the latter I am to refund the amount of the deficit.

With regard to (a):

Porters were enlisted by Civil Officials in accordance with Mobilisation Orders E.P.P.No.5.d/-20/9/05, who should have provided them with transit tickets. This was not done in all cases, as is borne out in the Staff diary page 6 of the R.F.F.

After enlistment they were sent up the line where it was my duty to distribute them to Columns.

At Nairobi, finding that some of them had not got the transit tickets, I went to the Collectors Office and requested him to give me them, but this he failed to do, which failure I reported to the Q.S.O. As the porters were still being sent up the line without being properly equipped I wrote to the Collector requesting that the matter might be seen into. This communication was not answered but had the whole the desired effect.

In consequence of the haphazard manner in which porters were being collected, equipped and despatched, I anticipated at once the possible result and took the following steps:-

(1) I issued orders to the transport Officers of all columns that no advances whatever were to be issued to any porters under any circumstances. (This will be found in one of the letter books handed over by Mr. Gamble my successor).

(2) I caused the authorised total number of porters enlisted to be entered in a book in which was also entered the distribution of the porters to the various columns. This was to ensure that no more than the authorised number were paid.

With regard to (b):

I issued a circular to all Transport Officers that no porter was to receive pay unless the head man of the gang could produce a "chit" shewing the numbers and names of his gang and their dates of enlistment and discharge. (This will also be found in the same letter books handed over by me).

According to Mr. Gamble's statement the non-recovered advances in sum Rs.383 which he admits were made after I had relinquished

my appointment; these may have been made under orders of my
censor, but in the absence of such orders were in direct con-
vention of the instructions issued by me.

With reference to the statement by Mr. Gamble and corroborated by
Major Mackay that I refused to take over the numbered tickets, I
give it an unqualified denial, as I had no verbal communication
with Mr. Gamble on this subject before leaving Nairobi to go up
country, as is suggested in the letter from Mr. Gamble to Major
Mackay. The tickets in question were eventually found in Mr.
Mackay's Office by the Adjutant of the 3rd L.A.R. (Capt. Jenkins)
on the demobilisation of Col. ...

I was fully aware of the necessity of badges and, as their issue
would have greatly simplified my work, I could have no possible
objection in declining to take them, and even if I had so declined
Mr. Gamble had only to report the matter to the senior officer in
Nairobi, who would have ordered me to take them over.

With regard to the telegram from Capt. Maycock that he received
orders from me as to the issue of advances, either Capt. Maycock's
memory must have failed him or else the order, through no fault
mine, must have miscarried. At the same time I can find no authority
to advance pay, as was done by Capt. Marrett and Maycock,
parties who they could not identify and for which they could not
account in return. This must therefore have been irregular.
I should be much obliged if this correspondence could be referred
to Major Hanmer, who is now in England and who I think will be
able to state facts. *Misconception as expressed by Mr. Jenkins.*
In conclusion, I beg to point out that ~~the~~ letter conveys
very serious implication as to the manner in which I carried out my
duties; I therefore request that my statement of the facts of
case may be put on record, so that my future prospects in the
view may not be prejudiced by the unfounded allegations made
against me.


