I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of January 25 (1953/05-6) transmitting papers relating to the prevention of Coffee Leaf disease 19 the East African Protectorite.

- Ceylon and now affects every Coffee-growing area in the Old World from Watal to Fiji.
- 3. It appears from the enclosure to Sir Thomas Sanderson's letter of July 24, 1896, on the Report of the German East Africa Company that the disease has obtained a firm hold of its Coffee plantations.
- 4. It further appears from Leaflet No. 10 of the British East Africa Department of Agriculture that the disease has made its appearance at Bura where Coffee cultivation was first started in the Protectorate in 1895.
- 5. As far as is known it has not yet made its appearance in either British Central Africa or in the Uganda Protectorate.
- 6. A good deal of correspondence from 1903 onwards has taken place between the Poreign Office and Kew on the subject of these Ordinances and I now enclose for your information a copy of a demi-official letter which I addressed on May 25, 1905, to the Director of Agriculture. Wainobi.

As a mile regulations have had very little effect in recking the apread of plant diseases. The elaborate Phylloxers regulations which were at one time in force on the continent have largely faller into abeyance.

The difficulty is to hold the balance between what is reasonable practicable and what would injurtously affect desirable enterprise.

It is a pity that the notten growers wix the sorts tray grow. They will realise their facilishmess when they try to market their produce. Cotton spinners sequence a uniform staple and any admixture will pull flows the price very seriously. In America the most sorupulous pains are taken to maintain a high established by selecting the seeds.

I do not know that I have any remarks to make on the draft regulations, Experience will be your best guide as to whether they are beneficial and workable. The most estaborate procautions will give no absolute security against the introduction of diseases. If disease makes its appearance, its progress can often be checked by destroying the Affected plants in situ. This is as much in the interest of the individual grower as of the community.
