The Officers selected for service in the East Africa Protectorate will not be required to resign their positions in the Home Service definitely on selection, but will receive leave of absence for the necessary period, and be appointed on probation for 12 months' residential service in the Protectorate. During this period the selected Officers would be seconded in the Home Customs Department and no increment would accrue; but they would retain their right of seniority and, at the termination of the period they would be called upon to decide whether they elect to resign the Home Customs definitely on transfer to the Protectorate or to revert to their former employment - in which case the passage home would be defrayed and leave of absence granted for two months commencing from the date of departure from Mombasa, at the expiration of which they would be re-employed in the Home Customs.
