Telegram from the Officer Administering the Government of the East Africa Protectorate to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Received Colonial Office 2.32 p.m. 19th April, 1907.)

Fifty-eight. My telegram No. 36 of the 16th of March. Considerable capital is being made by the local Press and the Colonists' Association out of the statement made by Your Lordship in the House of Lords that many of the participants in the flogging incident were armed, because this was not proved at the trial.

Reports received at the time justified the statement in my telegram. As however evidence could only be procured against Bowker and Gregan, the charges under the 144th section of the Indian Penal Code were not proceeded with.
