No. 20. Your Lordship's telegram of 20th April regarding
will report shortly embodying recommendations of
officers and principal officers. If Ordinance passed
now providing for abolition amount of compensation
payable to owners approximately estimated at
£100,000, but if my recommendations involving
abolition in the course of four years obtains sanction
amount of compensation probably will not exceed
£20,000.
